Harvard After Clean-Up

The Yale bulldog grows as Harvard's host of athletes approaches to make a clean sweep in the two remaining college years. Yale, the former tamer of Harvard in most kinds of sports, has two last chances to redeem himself in major sports within the next fortnight, and hence the bulldog's growl.

Harvard triumphed over the Blue in football, hockey and track athletics to date. These are the three major sports in which the two universities have so far competed, although hockey is not technically a major sport at New Haven.

Harvard, however, has made the rink pastime of major importance. The football score, 85 to 0, will not be forgotten for some time. The hockey series went to the Crimson players in 8 to 1. And the track meet, also of particular note, went to Harvard by a score of 38 to 31, following the dispute over and subsequent withdrawal of Ross, the Yale shotputter, after he had completed and apparently won the meet for Yale by a narrow margin.

Thus, with three-fifths of the season's honors already reaping in the Harvard trophy chest, Yale is particularly keen to redeem itself in the two remaining sports of the college year. The first opportunity will come on June 22, when the Harvard and Yale baseball teams meet for the first game of their series at New Haven. The second contest will be waged at Cambridge June 28 and the third and last will be at New York on neutral grounds on June 29.

The other sport in which the Crimson and the Blue will clash is crew racing, and the most spectacular contest of them all is then expected. Harvard cannot well forget the unexpected defeat that was passed to her in the year, when the Yale crew, looked upon as a dead one, won first honors by a matter of inches in the greatest feat that American athletes ever knew.

JUDGE KNOWLES TO HOLD  
FIRST COURT NEXT WEEK

E. T. C. Knowles, K.C., whose appointment as judge of the St. John province court, in succession to Judge J. R. Armstrong, was announced in The Times yesterday, will probably hold his first court on Monday next as he will be sworn in as soon as the appointment receives the signature of the lieutenant-governor.

Judge Knowles is a native of St. John, a son of the late Edward T. Knowles. He was admitted to the bar in 1871 and a few years ago was made King's Counsel. He studied law in the office of Morrison and King, the latter being the late Judge King of this city. Mr. Knowles has been a valued member of the faculty of the St. John Law School, is prominent in the Methodist church and an active temperance worker.
