## PICKS MANDELL TO SUCCEED LEONARD

He Has Defeated Bernstein Twice—Is Fast Boxer and Aggressive.

New York, Nov. 20.—(United Press)—Sammy Mandell, a good-looking, polished little gentleman from Rockford, Ill., has a fine chance to succeed Benny Leonard as the lightweight champion of the world if Leonard will permit himself to be succeeded.

Leonard has shown no disposition to defend his title and even if the New York Boxing Commission should apply the corrective measures of a suspension, his successor would not have the prestige or the recognition of a champion who had come into the possession of a title in the orthodox manner.

Mandell looks to be the best of the crop of young 135-pounders who are growing into contending class. There are many more experience and harder hitting aspirants for the class but most of them are in the trick division known as "junior welterweights," a class established by the New York commission and rather generally recognized for those who can't make 135 pounds and who are too light for legitimate welterweights.

Jack Bernstein, former junior lightweight champion, Mandell and Sid Terris are perhaps the only three legitimate-lightweight who can be regarded as championship possibilities.

Mandell has beaten Bernstein twice and fought one draw with him. It is true that the last decision Mandell won over Bernstein recently in Madison Square Garden was not by a margin that would eliminate Bernstein from further consideration. But the decision did make it more or less certain that Mandell always can beat Bernstein and that Mandell will improve with experience while Bernstein probably is at the top of his form or perhaps past it.

While he has been before the public for comparatively short time, Bernstein may be regarded as a young newcomer but he has been fighting for over ten years under various names, which is nothing against him, however.

Mandell is just a kid. He is younger than the age printed in the record book and he is just now filling out and developing into a sound physique. It is because he is young and only becoming matured and fully developed now that Mandell has not shown any great punching power. It will be recalled that Leonard didn't have a great punch when he started out and that he grew into it.

Mandell hits sharply and accurately and it is only natural to assume that he will get more power into his punches when he gets more strength in his shoulders and arms.

As a boxer, Mandell is perfectly and adequately qualified. It is a question now that Leonard has a better defense. Perhaps he did once but he can't possess the same speed and boxing ability when he has recovered out of the ring for so long. Mandell is the fastest boxer in the present class at any weight and he is stronger and more enduring than his age and weight would indicate.

To continue his way through the class, Mandell will have to beat Terris who ranks next to him at a boxer and a fast worker. Terris will have a big following when he meets the Illinois youngster but he is almost sure to be beaten if Mandell is in condition.

There is hardly a chance that Mandell ever will be out of shape unless he hurts his hands. He is a clean-living boy and he is handled by Eddie Kane, the manager of Tom Gibbons, who never will make the mistake of rushing him too fast.

Kane has done well in bringing the youngster along. He has developed him by careful matting with the purpose of schooling him against all kinds of boxing styles and the result is that Mandell knows how to take care of himself against boxers, punchers and those few of the class who like to rough it.

Mandell is supremely confident in himself. He asked that Kane get him the three matches with Bernstein when every boxer in the country was running away from the New Yorker. He asked Kane to get a match with Terris and there are few in the class that go out seeking an opponent of the class of Terris. He gave his manager a free hand in getting him any match offered and Kane merely wires him his dates and his opponents without asking his permission to make any match.

Mandell is a credit to the game. With Tom Gibbons, Gene Tunney and a few others, he has brought an intelligent type to boxing that the game has been badly in need of. Tunney is losing friends through his tendency to duck hard opponents, but no one can say that he was not a credit to boxing for the good name and the standing that he brought into the business with him. Nothing need be said about Gibbons because nothing could be said that hasn't been repeated a hundred times in the past. No finer character than Tom Gibbons has ever pulled on the gloves and that goes for Mandell. Benny Leonard and Jack Britton did much to elevate the game but Britton is through as a champion and it is doubtful that Leonard ever will fight again. Mickey Walker is a fine boy and he is going to be a great champion if he gets a chance from the misdirected zeal of the New York Boxing Commission.

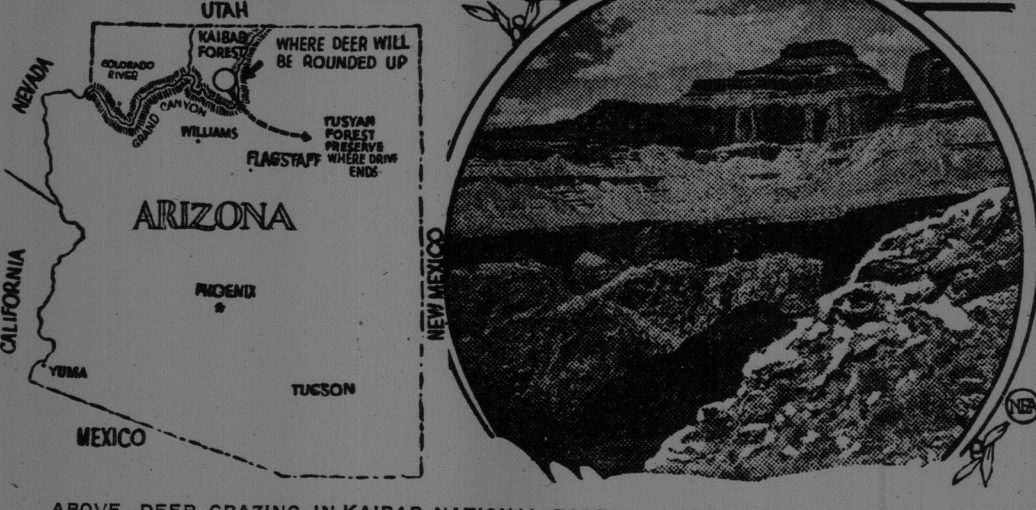
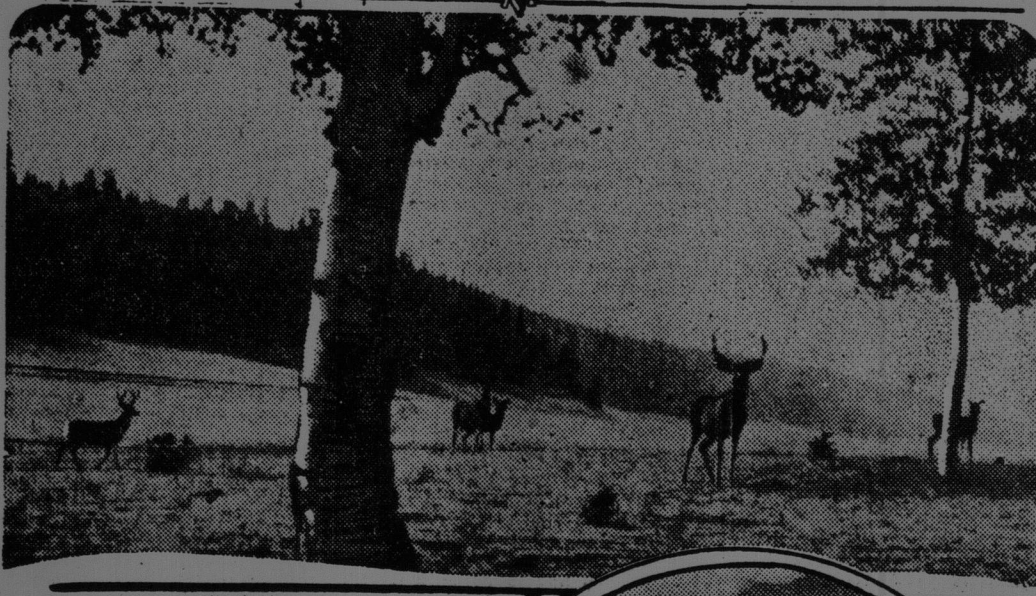
In general, the boxing game is now in the hands of a very high class type of champions, from the moral if not also from the physical standpoint.

## Southwest To Have Great Round-Up

Grand Canyon, Ariz., Nov. 19.—An attempt will be made this month to round up 3,000 to 5,000 deer, drive them to the Grand Canyon of the Colorado, down the steep slopes of the gorge, up the other side and to the Tusayan National Forest.

Federal officials doubt if the southwest's unique roundup will be a success. Some say that a cowboy for every deer will be required.

But State Game Warden G. M. Willard of Arizona and George McCormick, veteran flagstaff cattlemen, who has contracted to do the job, insist that it can be done.

McCormick will employ 100 picked cowboys.

The drive is planned to save the lives of the deer, now in the Kaibab National Forest, north of the Grand Canyon. The deer population has increased to the point where there is not grass enough to support them all. The transfer will be made to save the lives of thousands.

## HAGANLACKER HAS SEASON'S HIGH RUN

Scores 500 in Exhibition Match at 18.2 Balkline Billiards.

New York, Nov. 20.—Erich Haganlacker, holder of the 18.2 balkline championship of Germany, made one of the highest runs recorded this season in an exhibition match last night when he went out with an unfinished run of 500 in the ninth inning of his match with R. Braun at the Fourteenth Street Academy to win at 600 to 32.

Haganlacker, who has been a contender for the world's championship for the last three years, has displayed the ability to make sensational runs in exhibitions on numerous occasions and last year, at Maurice Daly's Academy, scored 505 caroms on a single turn at the table.

He started off rather unimpressively with his first eight turns at the table. In the ninth inning he warmed up with a run of 48 and then came his great exhibition in the tenth, marked by beautiful close-line nursing and numerous difficult masse and open table shots.

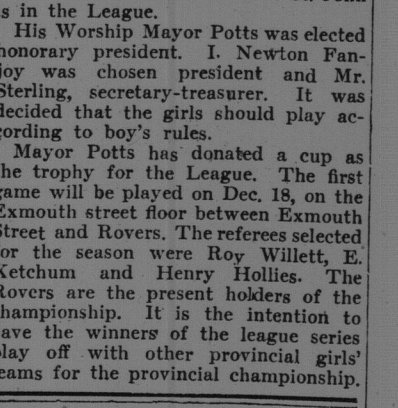
## GIRLS ORGANIZE FOR BASKETBALL
