

Troops Patrol the Streets of Duesseldorf and Enforce Laws.

A formal state of siege has not been declared, but the curfew law, tightly closing activities from 11 p. m. until 5 a. m. is being rig-

List Is Compiled. A casualty list compiled by the French authorities shows that 10 persons were killed and more than 200 wounded so badly as to need hospital treatment. Probably another hundred were slightly wounded. The French still hold all the security

Their investiga-tion so far has shown that all the police tion so far has shown that all the police who were on duty were men acting under proper authorization by the authorities of occupation and that no outside police participated in the trouble as some of the reports have had it.

Montreal Man Leaves Note Saying That His Wife Betrayed Him.

Montreal, Sept. 30—After shooting and killing his wife as she stood in the street opposite his room window, Jean Goerend, forty years of age, placed his head against the muzzle of his shotgun and ended his own life on Saturday afternoon. Previous to the shooting Goerend left a note on the dresser in his room in which he wrote: shooting Goerend left a note on the dresser in his room in which he wrote: "Do not worry about this case, I am shooting my wife and then I am killing myself. My wife betrayed me."

The shooting occurred at a time when there was a large number of persons in the street. The shot from the gun went across the street and struck Mrs. Goerend in the neck. She died almost instantly, When the police arrived they found the woman dead at the door of her home, and Goerend lay dead on the floor of his room on the second floor of a house across the
