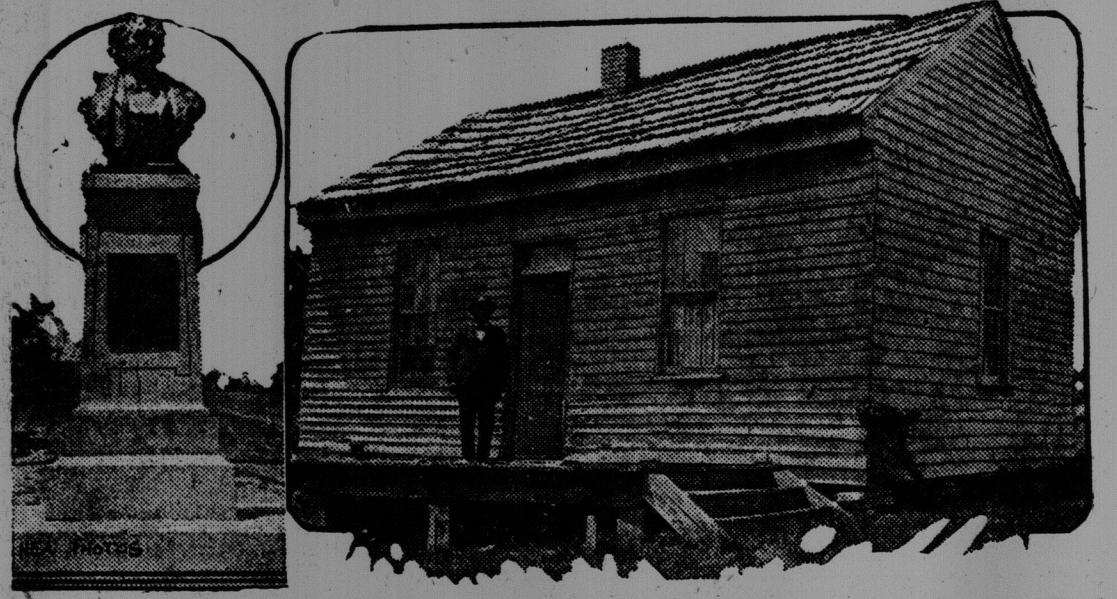


MEMORIAL TO MARK TWAIN

Plan to Perpetuate Humorist's Birthplace as Literary Shrine

Florida, Mo., A literary shrine to America's greatest humorist, even more unique and magnificent than the one dedicated to William Shakespeare at Stratford-on-Avon.
Such is the ambitious plan now being worked out by interested Missourians who expect, within two years, to establish a memorial park to Samuel Loughborough Clemens, most familiarly known as Mark Twain.
Florida—this little village, several miles from a railroad, located in north-eastern Missouri where Twain was born and where he spent many of his boyhood days—it is to be his location.
Once a thriving river town on the upper Mississippi, Florida has degenerated into a little country village of some 800 souls—due to the coming of the railroad. But with it all Florida swells with pride over the conspicuous place it occupies in history. An air of romance pervades the township and its outlying territory.
Girl Starts It.
Credit for starting the movement

must be divided among four persons.
—M. A. (Dad) Violet, owner of the home in which Twain was born; Frank B. Lamson, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce at Moberly, Mo.; H. J. Blanton, publisher of the Monroe County Appeal at Paris, Mo.; and Lamson's 12-year-old daughter, Ruth.
With "Dad" Violet the idea ever had been an obsession. He rescued the Twain birthplace from a wrecking crew, had it moved across the street on his own property and filled it with furnishings typical of the period of Twain's boyhood.
More than 5,000 tourists from every state in the Union visited the home during 1922. Ruth Lamson was one of them. She interested her father in the home. He immediately got in touch with Editor Blanton at Paris, and "Dad" Violet.
Violet told of having refused 8,000 from persons who wished to purchase the Twain home for mercenary reasons. He offered to donate the home and an appreciable amount of property as a location for the park if

the state of Missouri would improve it and guarantee the upkeep.
Then and there the nucleus of the Mark Twain Memorial Park Association was formed. Blanton became president and Lamson secretary.
Present plans of the association are to raise \$20,000 for the purchase of 100 acres of land adjoining Florida at the two forks of Salt River, besides the land offered by Violet. This property will overlook the "swimming hole" and other landmarks made famous by Twain in his various literary works.
The week of September 15 to 22 has been chosen for a national campaign to obtain funds.
August will be known as "Mark Twain Month," when book stores throughout America will be requested to make conspicuous display of Mark Twain volumes.
During the first week in September public schools, educational institutions, literary clubs, civic associations, fraternal societies and places of amusement will be urged to present a Mark Twain programme of instruction and entertainment.

WET CAUSE IS LOST, SAYS DR. C. W. ELIOT
Harvard's President Emeritus Sees No Chance of Change in Law.
Boston, Nov. 1.—The Volstead act and the 18th amendment will have no effect in the wrong direction, "modifications in the law," according to Dr. Charles W. Eliot, president emeritus of Harvard, who spoke before a joint meeting of legislative committees of the Massachusetts and Greater Boston Federations of Churches at the Church of Jerusalem.
Dr. Eliot made the statement, he said, after he had ascertained from leading politicians in Washington their true sentiment on the matter of prohibition and its ultimate success.

SIKI MUST TRAIN TO GET N. Y. BOUT

Will Have to Convince State Athletic Officials He is in Condition.

New York, Oct. 31.—Unless Battling Siki, Bengalese light-heavyweight, adjusts himself to the fact that he must prepare for ring bouts just as any other boxer must, local followers of the ring sport are liable to miss the opportunity of seeing the conqueror of Georges Carpentier in action here. This is the announcement of the State Athletic Commission. It is also the advice which the commission has imparted to Siki in his visits to the headquarters of the boxing officials. Siki has been informed that the commission will not act upon his application for a license until the afternoon of Nov. 20, the date of his scheduled fifteen-round battle with Kid Norfolk, rugged Baltimore negro.

The uncertainty of the condition of Siki is the reason the commission advances for this delay in acting upon the application. The boxing board wants to be convinced that Siki will be in physical condition to give the public a true exhibition before it will issue a license. Without a license Siki will not be permitted to box here. Barred from boxing in the Empire State, it will be difficult for Siki to capitalize his fight prowess in this country.
Siki's eccentricities have made him a frequent visitor at the offices of the State Athletic Commission. He now is under the direction of his third manager since arriving here. He was managed by Louis De Fremont when he landed in this country. Then Gene Semmet, Bronx promoter, undertook to do Siki's ring business. Now Robert Levy is recognized as Siki's manager. Three contracts have been signed at Madison Square Garden. Siki's last posed bout against Norfolk. Twice the contest has been postponed on such short notice that Siki was unable to get to the ring. A week before the date Siki again sought a postponement, and then the bout was scheduled for Nov. 20. Whether it will be conducted on this date is a matter of conjecture. Promoter Rickard is hopeful that Siki will get down to training and prepare himself for the bout.
It is the belief that Siki will have to be at his best on Nov. 20 if he is to vanquish Norfolk and impress an American boxing crowd with his ring prowess. Norfolk is a fast, clever and hard-hitting light-heavyweight who has emerged victorious in many hard ring encounters. He is training faithfully for the approaching battle, realizing that if he is successful against Siki he probably will obtain more lucrative matches.
Siki has sought to obtain his release from the contract to box Norfolk. The Bengalese light-heavyweight, according to Siki's promoters, has been barred from boxing here unless he engages Norfolk as his contract stipulates.

The marriage was to have been solemnized at 7 a. m. in St. Joseph's Cathedral. The excitement of the wedding is believed to have brought mental derangement to Reynolds, who received an injury to his head in a fall while in the service, for which he was receiving Government compensation.

Reynolds, however, is said to have had \$1,000 on his person when he disappeared, and one fear is that he may have been robbed, beaten and left somewhere for dead.

At that time he left his suitcase with her containing clothing and furnishings for the wedding trip, which was to take the young couple to Montreal, Quebec, and other places. He appeared then in his normal state. Early Saturday night, about 8.30 o'clock, he left his home in Nashua to go up town and buy a few things, he informed his mother. Dating from that instant his whereabouts have been a mystery.
