Grandmother Who Slew Son-In-Law Gets Reformatory

Killed to Save Her Grand-Daughter—Given Indefinite Term.

New York, June 14.—Mrs. Antoinette Fiorenza, humble and bewildered, a grandmother, was sentenced in New York County Court by Judge Edwin Caffrey to an indefinite term in the Clinton Reformatory for manslaughter. A murmur of pity and remonstrance swept the court room when the old woman made her sturdy departure. There was no vagueness about the charge on which Mrs. Fiorenza was convicted. She shot her son-in-law, Salvatore Juliano, a laborer, on the night of April 20, after her grand-daughter, Louisa Juliano, ten years old, burst into the room, frantic and sobbing, fleeing from her father. The man stumbled heavily into Mrs. Fiorenza's room, in pursuit. She drew a pistol from her bureau. Juliano turned, and as he ran away down the dark hall the grandmother's finger tightened on the trigger and the pistol exploded. The bullet killed him. New York has been extraordinarily stirred by the case. The county prosecutor declined to bring in a heavier charge than manslaughter. Hundreds of citizens, drawn from the city's business, social and philanthropic life, signed a petition urging clemency.

Newark was convinced she would be freed when the case came up, and would be able to return to her \$6 a week job in a shirt factory. Perhaps, Newark thought, a better job would be found for her. It was more than possible.

The droning conventions of a court of justice were observed for the first time by many men and women drawn by the unusual aspects of the trial. Overwhelming public sentiment applauded the blind courage of the grandmother in her emergency. The course of law seemed to shock many in the benches. The more sophisticated took comfort from the fact that Judge Caffrey made the sentence indefinite. It is his privilege to release Mrs. Fiorenza from the reformatory at any moment.

AFRICAN CHIEF BURNS SON TO PLEASE RAIN GODDESS

Youth Accused of Offending Girl Who Punished Tribe With Drought.

Rhodesia, (by Mail).—One of the most sensational trials ever held has just taken place in southern Rhodesia, six natives being found guilty of burning a young man in order to appease the Rain Goddess. At the end of last year there was a severe drought, and the natives in a remote part of the Mount Darwin district were convinced that some one had offended their Rain Goddess, a girl. The old chief of the tribe, Chiswili, declared that his son, Manduza, was the guilty person and ordered that he should be burned. Manduza was sacrificed, and as rain





Boston, June 13.—David Anderson, of Gloucester, was drowned and seven other fishermen narrowly escaped a similar fate tonight when the trawler Alden Mills sank the two-masted fishing schooner Agnes in Boston harbor. The crew of the trawler said that they saw no lights and had no warning of the presence of the schooner until the crash. Captain Elroy Pinto of Gloucester, skipper of the Agnes said his vessel was carrying regulation lights.

WOODSTOCK AND HYDRO.

(Woodstock Press.) On Wednesday afternoon of this

week there will be a meeting of the Provincial Cabinet in Fredericton. There is an application coming before it from the Woodstock Power Company for the construction of a hydro line by the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission to link up with the N. B. & Maine Company at Bridgewater, Maine, so that the local com-



pany might distribute the current at Woodstock. Delegations will be present from all the up-river towns and villages on that occasion.

The Woodstock Council, by resolution, decided to send the members of the board, supplemented by a delegation from the Board of Trade, to favor the erection of proposed line, but protesting against the distribution of the current in the town by any private company, inasmuch as the town desires to distribute the power itself and has accepted the offer of the Power Company to purchase its transmission line under arbitration.

The council, also, by resolution, decided to ask for an order-in-council empowering it to issue bonds to purchase a crude oil unit, or some other unit, to supplement the plant owned by the town, to enable it to furnish power and light for its own use.

SEN. FOWLER LOST HEAVILY.

Moncton Times.—Senator George W. Fowler, of Sussex, passed through the city last evening en route to Ottawa. Senator Fowler came down to Sussex in connection with the adjustment of his losses on property burned in the recent fire there. He was not fully covered by insurance and his financial loss in consequence runs into many thousands of dollars.
