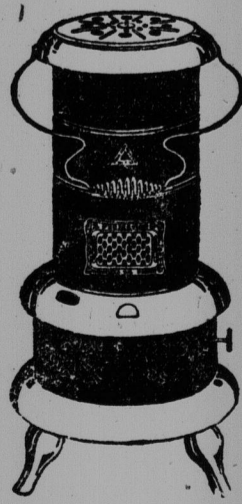

#### THRONGS AT RENFORTH RACES

(Continued from page 1.)

Section 11—The Umpire, when appealed to, shall decide all questions as to a foul.

Section 12—A claim of foul must be made to the Judge or the Umpire by a competitor himself before getting out of his boat.

Section 13—In case of a foul, the Umpire shall have the power (a) to place the boats (excepting the boat committing the foul, which is disqualified) in the order in which they come in. (b) To order the boats engaged in the race, other than the boat committing the foul, to row over again on the same or another day. (c) To re-start the qualified boats from the place where the foul was committed.

Section 14—Every boat shall abide by its accidents, except when during a race, a boat while in its own water, within the course) shall be interfered with by any outside boat, the Umpire may order the race to be rowed over, if in his opinion such interference materially affected its chances of winning the race.

Section 15—No boat shall be allowed to accompany a competitor for the purpose of directing his course or affording him other assistance. The boat receiving such direction or assistance shall be disqualified at the discretion of the Umpire.

Section 16—The jurisdiction of the Umpire extends over the race and all matters connected with it, from the time the race is specified to start until its termination, and his decisions in all cases shall be final and without appeal.

Section 17—Any competitor refusing to abide by the decision or to follow the directions of the Umpire, shall be disqualified.

Section 18—In turning races, each competitor shall have a separate turning stake, and shall turn from port to starboard. Any competitor may turn any stake other than his own, but does so at his peril.

Section 19—The Umpire, if he thinks proper, may reverse his decision provided that in every case such decision be given on the day of the race.

### SEVEN INCH VEIN OF ALBERTITE

Important Discovery Within  
Two Miles of the Famous  
Old Mines.

Within less than two miles of the famous old Albertite mines in Albert county a vein of seven inches of pure Albertite has been located and indications point to a larger body of this coal so valuable in oil, in that locality. The place is East Albert Mines, Lower Hillsboro. Boring operations have been carried on for some time. A small vein had been found at the start, and the borings were made to learn if a thicker seam could be got at a greater depth. A seven-inch vein has been struck at a depth of 122 feet, sufficient to warrant the belief that a larger body is to be found underneath, especially as other small veins have been found last week of larger find. Albertite is extremely rich in oil running from 50 gallons to the ton, and in these days when oil is so valuable the value of a large bed of Albertite would be very great.

### URBAN J. SWEENEY DIED THIS MORNING

Urban J. Sweeney, a well-known barrister of this city, died at 5:25 this morning at his residence, 57 St. David street, after an illness of four months. Mr. Sweeney became very ill in May last and for a time there was very little hope of his recovery, but he improved in health and was becoming quite well when he had a relapse and steadily declined until his death this morning.

After receiving a degree of Bachelor of Arts at St. Joseph's College, Moncton, in 1910, he was articled in this city. In 1912 he received the degree of B. C. L. from King's College and soon after conducted his first case. The following year he joined with Stanley B. Taylor in the real estate business and he had remained in this business up to the time of his death.
