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CANNOT LOCATE THE CANADIANS WHO WERE AT EUCHARISTIC CONGRESS

Party of Priests Unable to Get From Havre to England—Canadians in London Volunteer

London, Aug. 14.—W. L. Griffith, secretary of the High Commissioner's office, says that many Canadian officers and doctors now in London are volunteering for active service. It was certain that the War Office would accept the services of the former, but there was some difficulty in regard to doctors volunteering for the Army Service Corps, as they were not licensed to practice here, but Hon. Mr. Perley expects to adjust the difficulty.

Applications for assistance by stranded Canadians were being scrutinized in the most lenient spirit.

John A. Reid, Agent-General for Alberta, announces that the War Office is accepting Alberta's offer of half a million bushels of oats. Many Canadians have not been located, and it is not even known whether they are on the continent or in Britain. There is a great disparity in the statements as to the whereabouts of the Canadian contingent to the Eucharistic Congress at Lourdes. The Ontario government office thinks they are now in Rome, while the High Commissioner believes they are at Havre. It is known that a party of priests, now at the latter port, wished to return by the steamer La France, but the sailing has been cancelled.

Mrs. Finch, of Edmonton, has been located in Brussels, but her husband, who is in Manchester, is unable to get his wife across. Chief Justice Harvey, of Alberta, arrived at Stockholm in the clothes he stood in, but lost all his baggage in Germany.

Hon. Duncan Marshall, minister of agriculture for Alberta, had been studying agricultural conditions in the Netherlands and Denmark, and just refrained from proceeding to Germany before war was declared. The government has requisitioned the Glenarm Head, a regular freighter to Montreal.
