CHICAGO HAS FIRST MUNICIPAL DANCE

From Mayor Harrison Down 7,000 Make Big Success of City's Experiment

Father Dearborn, for many years a social recluse, was host of the other night at his own coming out party and 7,000 of his children danced with him, says a Chicago despatch. And the dancing was just as it used to be when Father Dearborn was a boy. There were no tangoes, fox trots, maxims, bunny hops, Philadelphia flips or lissed dances—let's see! oh yes, the waltz and two-step, they were called—came back into their own.

It was Chicago's first "municipal dance," and possibly because Major Funkhouser was expected a thick layer of policemen and policemen was spread around the walls of the big Dreamland dance hall at Van Buren and Pulaski streets before the doors were thrown open.

Within the police cordon were other rings of professional social workers' amateur social workers and investigators all equipped with orders to stop anything that faintly resembled the dances of the modern school.

Major Funkhouser was not the only public character by any means who honored Father Dearborn with his presence. From Mayor Harrison to the office boy in the Department of Public Works, office in the City Hall, folk were there.

From Chief Gleason and Assistant Chief Schuetter, hands in kid gloves and debonairly conversing with silk clad women, to Probationary Patrolman Murphy, walking in his uniform before the appraising glances of a pair of more experienced lady officers, the police department was represented.

Then there was County Judge Owens and Municipal Judge Goodnow and all sorts and conditions of judges in black robes, together with Assistant State Attorneys Whitty and Sullivan and a contingent from the North Side.

There were present, too, many persons whose faces were familiar to the assistants prosecutors and to the police officials, who had met them in a professional way. But there was no misunderstanding. "Ratty the Dip" and "Smelly the Rat" were out for pleasure and not for business.

But the bulwarks of the whole affair, the official dances, notwithstanding, were the thousands of Johns and Marys who had come to see what fun there could be in city supervised dancing. When it was all over the Johns and Marys, a bit tired and impressed with the terepsichorean possibilities of the old time dances, indicated by a rising vote that they would come again—and come often.

Prince Bismarck, who is credited with inventing the gospel of "blood and iron," had a deep, dry sense of humor which is sadly lacking in Germany at the present day. The numerous epistles in his recollections to ambassadors and generals are full of caustic comment on affairs in Europe generally, and Germany in particular. In one of his many long letters to a friend, Gen. Von Gerlach, the Iron Chancellor makes an almost Yankee observation about the German people.
