Merger in the Air.

Montreal, July 8—The Daily Witness last night and from their Toronto correspondent: "The report was current on the street this morning that when Sir William Mackenzie returns from Europe there will be a merger of the Toronto street with the London Electric and the Dominion Power & Transmission Company of Hamilton. These companies represent a capitalization of \$57,000,000 and the new company will probably have a capitalization of \$40,000,000. The fact that certain inside interests have been aware of the proposed merger, and have been quietly gathering in Toronto street railway stock during the last few days is said to account for the fact that the stock has been selling from 142 to 144 and not the possibility of another Toronto street railway merger. The merging of these companies is said to be but the preliminary step of the Mackenzie-Mann interests for the establishment of electric lines throughout western Ontario with a trunk line to Windsor."
