Ottawa, Aug. 20—Though the greater proportion of the butter at present imported into Great Britain comes from the overseas dominions and though that importation has increased tremendously within the last decade Canada has ceased to be a factor in the export of butter to Great Britain.

This fact is learned from a report from the trade commissioner at Birmingham, just issued by the department of trade and eommerce. Ten years ago, Canada, which is the nearest of the dominions to Great Britain. Twelve months ago the export fell to 776 tons. For the year ended last June Canadian butter never received a quotation on the London market.


