THE PRISON FARM

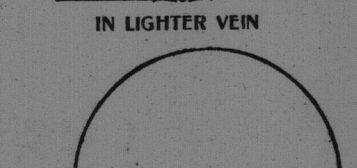
LITTLE THINGS. A goodly kiss is a little thing. With your hand on the door to go.
