He also stated that he found a lot of men, so called men, about middle age, who are even as bad...

He stated that there were some of these games running the city and of these he had seen card playing going on in certain places in the city...

In stating what he thought to be the cause of such conditions in a city, he attributed it to graft or police inefficiency and sometimes both...

He made up his mind to get acquainted with both the chief and the commissioner and find out who was to blame...

The chief submitted a statement of twenty-two pages of typewritten matter, of which six pages were devoted to copies of letters which passed between the chief and myself...

The chief's statement was prepared in two parts and at the conclusion of the first part he states as follows:

I wish to say in conclusion that from the evidence of this man, Sullivan, I have no hesitation in saying that a conspiracy was hatched having for its object the entrapping of myself by a bribe...

While I consider the chief's statement throughout nothing but bald-dash and the greater portion of it as an attempt to create sympathy with the public...

I proceeded to question him and after doing so, and considering the nature of the answers elicited, I decided to make some recommendations as to action to be taken...

That his statement "that this investigation will have a tendency to destroy discipline and weaken the efficiency of the force..."

As you are aware, at the time of the firebug scare it was decided that the city should take some steps to detect the parties who were supposed to be setting the fires...

When asked if I had any idea of the guilty parties or if I had any suspicion of them, I replied that I had in my office the names of several parties against whom suspicion was directed...

While I knew that a second man was working in the city, he had no communication with or orders from me or from any member of this commission...

Who is there among the tax-payers but will admit that there has been a fall recently effected in the market for fire losses...

I believe that the committee from the Board of Fire Underwriters feels just as well satisfied with their expenditure as I do regarding the amount expended by the city...

As I have previously stated in connection with the chief's statement about the employment of Sullivan to bribe him, the nefarious work, and who paid Sullivan, I consider it nothing but bald-dash and an attempt to create sympathy with a credulous portion of the public...

That in concluding this report, it would be expected that I should make some recommendations as to action to be taken.

If the power to take action were vested in the Common Council, where it should be, I would unhesitatingly present for your consideration what I conceive to be a remedy for the existing state of affairs...

I therefore content myself with submitting the evidence and findings to the best judgment of my colleagues as to any action which should be taken upon the subject I have investigated.

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
