HAIL RUINS WHEAT.

Heavy Damage Done to Crops in the Province of Manitoba.

Winnipeg, Aug. 5.—Great damage by hail was done during the past twenty-four hours throughout Manitoba. Around Thornhill over seven thousand acres were thrashed out early.

A large area around Strathclair suffered similarly, while Birtle, Carman and Stonewall also report severe damage. Around Pionier it is estimated that 175,000 bushels have been destroyed.

At Glenboro, Man., wheat cutting has commenced. L. McFadden having started his binder on Tuesday in a forty-acre field. He reports a good crop, and the sample promise to be of high standard. Numerous farmers are busy cutting oats and barley. Farm laborers are scarce, and the demand is great.

Portage la Prairie—Wheat-cutting started yesterday near Burnside. Barley and oat thrashing also begins this week.

Carman—Farmers are busy harvesting barley in Dufferin, and some expect to start in on wheat next week.

ANOTHER STRIKE FEARED.

Trouble Expected From Miners at North Sydney, N.S.

North Sydney, N.S., Aug. 5.—An official of the Nova Scotia Steel & Coal Co. is authority for the statement that the company look forward to a strike of the U.M.W. miners in their collieries as inevitable in the near future.

An active supporter of the U.M.W. and last night that there would be no strike at Sydney Mines. At No. 3 colliery, where he is employed and where about 90 per cent. of the men are U.M.W. supporters, there is no talk at present of such a step. There is a good deal of dissatisfaction among the men with the recent award of the conciliation board. The chief cause of recognition of the union, which the company is not disposed to grant.

Manager T. J. Brown is at present in New Glasgow, where a conference is being held by the chiefs of the Nova Scotia Steel Co.

The U.M.W. have very little strength in Sydney Mines, Florence being the only point in which they outnumber the P.W.A.

BLOOD STILL FLOWS

Prisoners Are Being Executed Wholesale in Barcelona.

PLAYING AT REVOLUTION

Children on Streets Mimic Their Elders—Authorities Are Exacting a Heavy Price From Political Offenders—Soldiers and Officers Are Deserting Their Regiments and Are Leaving Spain.

London, Aug. 5.—The Barcelona correspondent of The Telegraph says that for the present quiet is restored, yet there are certain doubts whether the revolution has received its death blow. Martial law is still in force. The civil guards and police, armed with rifles, still patrol the streets.

The wholesale execution of prisoners after court-martial still goes on at the Fortress of Montjuich. Rumor states that the revolutionists will re-commence outrages unless the remaining prisoners are released.

Deserters continue on a large scale. Prisoners are constantly seen with their hands tied behind their backs and escorted by civil guards. Two well known journalists of Anarchistic tendencies were arrested Monday. Many officers and soldiers are deserting and crossing the frontier. Many bodies have been found under the ruins of the convents. Members of the Red Cross can still see transporting charred remains. Optimists should not omit to note the large bloodstains on the uniforms of the Red Cross men.

The correspondent, in a despatch played Monday, describes children playing at revolution, shooting at each other with toy rifles and crying "Viva la Republica." He declares it would take volumes to describe the desolation now spreading its cloak over Barcelona.

In speaking of the convent Church of the Magdalena, he says: "The whole place is a heap of ruins, which are still smoking, although the place was set on fire five days ago. In the garden there were thirty vaults where dead sisters were buried."

Killed by Tight Lacing.

Cincinnati, Aug. 5.—Miss Elsie Gasser, eighteen years old, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John J. Gasser of No. 2419 West McMicken avenue, is dead.

Dr. Gustave Strobach, the family physician, says in a note that she died by the tight lacing of corsets and clothes.

Miss Gasser was stricken about ten days ago with what appeared to be appendicitis. An operation followed, but the surgeon could trace no harm to the appendix. All of the consulting physicians who attended her joined with Dr. Strobach in saying that the young woman was a victim of fashion.

Caused Collision to Prevent Arrest.

Sebastopol, Russia, Aug. 5.—Lieut. Aquilonoff, in command of the submarine sunk off Sebastopol last June by collision with a battleship, with the loss of twenty lives, has been sentenced to five years' penal servitude for embezzling naval funds. The newspapers accuse Aquilonoff of intentionally causing the collision to hush up the embezzlement charges.

A Pastor Accused.

New Orleans, La., Aug. 5.—Thirty-one indictments against Rev. John J. Holgrave, pastor of the Catholic Church at Plaquemine, La., were returned by the grand jury of Iberville parish yesterday. Twenty-eight of the counts charge grave crimes and the other three allege criminal libel.

I.C.R. Loss by Fire.

Halifax, Aug. 5.—The loss to the I.C.R. as a result of fire at Richmond will be under \$10,000. Twenty-four cars were burned, including 1 box car, one flat car and ten coal hoppers. There was between 1,000 and 1,500 tons of coal in the shed, and half of it was lost.

A Tragic Death.

Pittsfield, Mass., Aug. 5.—Wm. R. Mitchell, a graduate of Brown University this year, was killed by eight tons of pig-iron which broke through a ceiling and fell upon him while he was at his desk.

ANXIETY IN SWEDEN

Labor Trouble in Stockholm Continues to Grow Worse.

FOOD IS BECOMING SCARCE

Ferry Services Are Cut Off and Fine Stares Citizens in the Face—Everybody Goes Armed In Fear of Trouble and Tourists Have All Deserted the City—Troops Are Guarding People's Property.

Stockholm, Aug. 5.—The labor conflict in Sweden showed signs yesterday of becoming more acute and the ranks of the strikers were considerably swelled. But the general strike called for yesterday has not yet become entirely effective. Many organizations, although sympathizing with the strikers, hesitate to join them actively.

The employees of the street car lines and the cab drivers stopped work. Troops are protecting the gas works and the electric lighting plant, and this step has increased the workmen, whose leaders threaten to call a strike unless the soldiers are withdrawn. The printers' union held a meeting yesterday, but resolved to postpone for the present any decision in the matter of going on strike.

A corps of workmen, some thousand strong, is being organized with the object of maintaining order and the people generally, bankers, merchants, etc., are arming themselves for self-protection. The gun shops of the city are practically denuded of revolvers and small arms.

All the tourists have left Stockholm, and the number of visitors now in the city is smaller than for many years past.

The streets of Stockholm present a curious appearance. They are filled with idlers who promenade back and forth, noting the changed conditions and chaffing the volunteer street cleaners, many of whom belong to the better classes. All the saloons are closed, and only the best restaurants are permitted to remain open, and even then it is possible to get wine only by ordering a solid meal.

All the ferries have stopped running, and there is no communication between Stockholm and the suburbs reached by water routes. This fact will result in a further diminution of food supplies. Trouble is expected when stocks of foods begin to run low.

New Cable Line.

New York, Aug. 5.—The Colonia, the cable-laying steamship of the Telegraph Construction & Maintenance Co. of London has arrived in port, having just completed the laying of the Commercial Cable Co.'s new cable from St. John's, Nfld., to New York.

Long before the Colonia's big gray hull loomed up through the mist of the early morning the cable was carrying messages through the station at Cackkhol Cove, near St. John's, at the rate of 50 words a minute, and, according to the experts of the cable company, was showing excellent electric qualities.

According to Engineer Petley, the shore end of the cable weighs about 16 tons to the mile, while the deep sea cable, but an inch in diameter, weighs one-eighth as much. In the sweep of the circle made from St. John's here to avoid shoals the cable lies for more than 150 miles in 3,000 fathoms, or 18,000 feet, of water.

French Gold for Canada.

Montreal, Aug. 5.—Lemoyne De Martigny, a French Canadian banker, who has for twenty years resided in Paris, where he also represents L. J. Forget & Co., is now in the city and says that the time is very ripe for educational work amongst French capitalists as to the resources of the Dominion.

They are, he says, particularly well disposed towards us, and all they want is the knowledge that the investment is safe.

He says it was a great pity that C.P.R. shares had not got into the hands of French investors, when they went to Hollanders many years ago (or such a transaction would have been a great "ad" for Canada all these years on the French money market.

Former Cashier Under Arrest.

Brockville, Aug. 5.—Miss Grace Henderson, a young woman of Gananoque, is under bond of \$6,000 to appear in Brockville Police Court next Monday for a preliminary hearing on the charge of stealing \$2,020 in cash, and converting to her own use two checks for \$372 and \$56.04 respectively. The complainant is the Thousand Island Railway Co., in which offices at Gananoque Miss Henderson was employed as cashier and bookkeeper for four or five years previous to the end of January.

Fined For Blocking Road.

Chatham, Aug. 5.—Conductor Sylvester Pitt of London was found guilty of allowing his C.P.R. train to block Raleigh street crossing for 14 minutes on July 27, and was fined \$1 and costs, \$9 in all, in the Police Court yesterday. Magistrate Houston stated that in future heavier penalties would be imposed. City Solicitor Lewis stated that the city is going to rigidly enforce the law.

Typhoid at Brockville.

Brockville, Aug. 5.—Brockville's two hospitals are treating 31 typhoid cases which have developed within a week or two past. Suspicions are cast on the milk and water supply, and samples of both are being analyzed. Meatmen citizens are boiling water.

A Peculiar Accident.

North Bay, Aug. 5.—Emma Dubo, a young woman of eighteen years, from Waukegan, was walking with her sister along the track when wings of the gravel plow struck her full in the face, breaking her nose, and cutting and lacerating her face.
