Bell Island

In a letter received from Bell Island during the week and dated May 3rd, we take the following extracts: "There is practically no work at present in the section in which I am now working. But as regards the future, it looks more hopeful. There are about 700 miners, viz. at the Wabano mines. The Adventure loaded ore on Monday for Spiny and another steamer loaded on Saturday for Middleborough, Bag.

According to reports here the main haulage-line is to start between the 15th and 20th to convey the ore across the Island to the D. I. & S. Co. pier, which is the first operation. Work here will be largely governed by hostilities."

While in England visits were paid to Scarborough, Newcastle and other places of interest, and Mr. Bateman secured a piece of a German shell which was thrown at Scarborough during the raid which resulted in the destruction of property and the killing of innocent people—men, women and children.

Gulf Steamers Returned

Three of the Gulf sealing steamers, Diana, Viking and Terra Nova, have returned from the icefields practically clean.

The Diana hails for 400 seals; the Viking 500 seals; and the Terra Nova 2,500. All these steamers had to contend with heavy sheets of large ice which no steamer, no matter how powerful, could penetrate. The Terra Nova would have secured a saving trip but for the men striking, as she was in the old seals at the time. There is no word yet of the Norwegian sealers, but it is thought they also fared badly.
