

# IN THE KING'S NAVY

#### Some World's Record Shooting by Crew of H. M. S. Alfred.


H. M. S. King Alfred, of the China station, recently carried out some remarkably fine shooting tests. The tests were what are known as the light Q. F. gun-layers' tests, and took place at Wei-Hai-Wei. The details of the shooting will be read with pride by everyone interested in the British navy. The 12-pounder guns fired 143 rounds, and obtained 104 hits, the shooting of being as follows:

The average rounds per minute was 3, and the average hits worked out a 9.45. Fourteen hits in 16 rounds is little short of marvellous, and the British navy should be proud of such a man as H. Blaydes, A.B., who performed this world's record with the first gun. No less striking wa sthe result of the firing of the three-pounder guns. The total number of rounds fired was 51, the total hits being 34. The best threepounder gun fired 17 rounds and made 13 hits. The gun-layer in this case was P. Beech, A.B., who deserves special praise. The time allowed for each gun to fire is 55 seconds.

These remarkable results, which should place the King Alfred an easy first in the navy this year are all the nore creditable, and all the more remarkable, seeing that the vessel has only been in commission six months. The King Alfred flies the flag of Vice-Admiral the Hou. Sir Hedworth Lambton, K.C.B., Commander-in-Chief in China
