There has been considerable discussion among the military men in Washington as to the propriety of an immediate attack upon Charleston, or New Orleans, by sea, for the purpose of diverting the attention of the Southerners.

The Unionists of Kentucky have carried the State by a large majority. The news was received throughout the North with great enthusiasm.

There are now 900 "colored contrabands" at Fort Monroe, valued at \$600,000. Despatches from Springfield, Missouri, state that hundreds of Unionists are flying into that State from Texas and Arkansas, on account of the persecution of the Secessionists.

The Navy department will at once issue proposals for the twelve paddle-wheel steamers, and for one or more iron clad vessels (similar to the "Warrior") authorized by Congress.

There is little news with regard to the movements of the Southern troops. A gentleman recently arrived at Washington from Vienna, Va., states that the estimate made of their killed alone at Manassas is 2,700.

The Southern Government have provided for the manufacture on a large scale of rifled cannon. A force of one thousand or twelve hundred men are engaged in this way at Richmond.

The Richmond papers tell a different story from the Northern papers with regard to the number of Federal troops killed at Bull's Run. One bearing date the Saturday after the battle says: "Thousands of the enemy's dead still remain unburied, though our troops have been steadily engaged since Monday in furnishing them with hospitable graves."

There is said to be considerable apprehension existing in North Carolina of a rising among the slaves. Immediately after the reading of the telegram from Jeff Davis to the Confederate Congress assembled at Richmond, announcing the great victory at Bull's Run, the following resolution was offered and unanimously adopted:

"Resolved.—That we recognize the hand of the Most High God, the King of Kings and Lord of Lords, in the glorious victory with which He hath crowned our army at Manassas, and that the people of the Confederate States are invited, by appropriate services on the ensuing Sabbath, to offer up their united thanksgiving and praise for this mighty deliverance."

The Herald has published many extracts from the Southern papers, which confirm the statement of a very heavy loss on their side. But it is not nearly so great as the Northern make it to be. The estimate of the New Orleans Picayune is between 600 and 800 killed, and between 2,000 and 3,000 wounded, many very slightly.

department is entirely inefficient. The attention of the President has been directed to this matter. Hostilities on the sea have been quite active. The U. S. steamer St. Lawrence, attached to the Charleston blockading squadron, fell in on the 20th ult., with a privateer called the Petrel.

The Union troops in Missouri have lately gained a battle over the Secessionists, at a place called Dog Springs. It is said that the attack on the Union side, was by a body of Cavalry commanded by Gen. Lyon, and numbering only some 270 men.

General McDowell has at length published an official report of the Battle of Bull's Run. He says that the battle was won by the Northerners at half-past three, but that the arrival of the first troops under Johnston at that time converted the victory into a disastrous defeat.

The town of Hampton, near Fortress Monroe, has been burned by the rebels. Many of the inhabitants fled to the Fortress for refuge. They are being cared for by Gen. Butler.

General Fremont has command at St. Louis. So inefficient is the blockade of the Southern ports that the privateers are daily growing more insolent. At one time the important port of Charleston was left entirely unguarded for fifty hours.

By order of the Secretary of War all slaves voluntarily entering the lines of the Federal army are to be employed and taken care of; loyal masters to be reimbursed hereafter in such a way as Congress may decide.

It is announced on what is considered good authority that Gribaldi has volunteered his services to the President through the American Consul at Genoa, in to receive the rank of Major General. He is shortly expected to arrive.

A decisive battle is daily expected in Missouri. The rebels under Beauregard are represented as almost entirely in their clamours for an advance on Washington. Prince Napoleon left Washington yesterday for New York.
