Public Hospital Report. The report of the General Public Hospital which was presented to the Legislature on Wednesday by Premier Pugsley showed that 1,186 patients had been treated there during the past year. Of this number seven hundred and twenty-five were discharged as cured, one thousand two hundred and thirty-two as showing improvement. In five died and twelve are incurable. Ninety-five died and eighty are still undergoing treatment. Of the patients four hundred and forty-six were males and seven hundred and forty females; four hundred and twenty-eight were married. The number of operations performed were two hundred and sixty-two. Of the patients four hundred and sixty-nine were residents of St. John and county, two hundred and fifty-one came from points in New Brunswick outside of St. John and county, and thirty-six from beyond the bounds of the province.
