Suit of Mrs. Mason, of East Boston,
Against L. C. R. - Chelsea Lady
Gets Letter from King Edward

DOSTON, April 28.—Mrs. Annie B. Mason of East Boston, who some time ago brought suit against the King of Great Britain for \$10,000 for injuries sustained by her on the Intercolonial railroad at Chatham, N. B., in October last, says that the case will be carried to the United States supreme court providing the superior court of Suffolk county, where the case now is, decides adversely to her. It is held that a suit against the sovereign of a friendly nation has no standing in the courts of this country, and Judge Fessenden of the local court is now considering this phase of the question. Mrs. Mason says: "When I instituted the suit I did not know that I was really suing King Edward, but when I found it out it made me feel that I was suing the king. I was visiting relatives in Canada in the fall of 1906 and was preparing to start for home in Boston when I received the injuries from which I have not recovered yet. I was boarding a train at Chatham station, New Brunswick, when I was struck by another train and badly hurt. I was thrown to the ground, my leg was hurt and I was given a violent nervous shock."

Burlington, Vt., has a rumor that La Presse and La Patrie of Montreal are shortly establishing plants in that city for the purpose of publishing papers for their subscribers in the United States. The new postal laws taxing Canadian papers four cents a pound is said to have made it unprofitable to send the papers across the border from Canada. Representatives of the papers named have been in Burlington looking over the ground.

Mrs. George Dixon of Quincy applied to the district court last week for a warrant for the arrest of Mary Muree, aged 18, whom she charges with the abduction of her 13-year-old sister, Amanda Muree. The warrant was refused. The Muree girls came from Yarmouth, N. S., a year ago and Amanda went to live with Mrs. Dixon, the latter claiming that the girl's parents in Yarmouth placed her in her charge. Mary Muree recently took her sister away and placed her at a friend's house. The court held that Mrs. Dixon must show legal proof that the girl had been placed in her charge. Archibald McNeilan of Boston, one of the defendants in the celebrated Christian Science litigation, is a native of New Brunswick.

Mr. and Mrs. William Wheeler, who were married in St. John, recently celebrated their 25th anniversary at their home in Somerville. An unknown young woman who has been at the city hospital here for two weeks has been identified as Miss Catherine E. McDonald, a dressmaker of Weymouth Bridge, N. S. She is seriously ill and her father in Nova Scotia has been notified. She had been lodging at 196 Dartmouth street, South End, and when she became ill the landlady did not know who her friends were. Foster V. Young of Aylesford, N. S., is one of those who received the highest honors at the Worcester Academy during the term just closed.

Miss Agnes Tobin of 247 Webster avenue, Chelsea, has a letter of thanks from King Edward of England. Miss Tobin, who lives with her sisters on Webster avenue, was born in Nova Scotia near Halifax, and her birthday happens to fall on the anniversary of the King's wedding day, March 10. It required some courage on her part, she said, to write the king, but she finally decided to do so, congratulating him on the anniversary and wishing him many returns. Incidentally she mentioned the fact that she was born on March 10 and that she was a loyal subject. Greatly to her surprise, for she had no idea that Edward VII. would reply to her note, she received an official-looking envelope a few days ago, marked "Buckingham Palace," and when she opened it she found a

gracious expression of thanks from the British monarch. The note, which is written on the King's personal stationery, bears a coronet in red, and like the envelope, is marked, "Buckingham Palace." It follows: "The private secretary is commanded by the King to thank Miss Agnes Tobin for her letter of the 11th ult., and for the kind wishes contained therein."

Chas. H. French of Lowell, engineer of the New York, New Haven and Hartford railroad, does not know whether some person is attempting to make him a victim of a confidence game or is endeavoring to bring about a family reunion. As yet French has parted with no money and does not expect to, if he has his eyes open. A day or two ago a stranger, who appears to know all about his family, called on him and informed him that French's father, who disappeared from his family and friends 59 years ago, had appeared in Halifax, N. S., and was wealthy and anxious to be reunited to the members of his family. French says that he was four years old when his father disappeared. The stranger told him that the elder French was 94 years of age and would visit him as soon as the weather got warmer. A daughter of Engineer French is of the opinion that her grandfather would not be more than 78 at this time. French is investigating the story. He says he thinks there may be something in it, but he has determined to place himself on guard against possible fraud.

The Fall River Evening News is greatly impressed with the recent Canadian Labor legislation. It says editorially: "The Dominion has shown commendable fearlessness and foresight in attempting a practical solution of present day industrial conflicts. In 1900 a voluntary conciliation act, which has proved quite effective was enacted. This was followed in 1903 by legislation providing machinery for compulsory arbitration in case of railway troubles. The act just passed goes still further in that it widens the range of compulsory arbitration so as to include all public utilities, including mines, steam and street railways, steamships, electric light, water and power works. What Canada has thus accomplished has been repeatedly recommended to Congress by the highest authorities in our own land. The anti-trust legislation appointed by President Roosevelt, for example, expressed the belief that the state and federal governments should provide the machinery for what may be called compulsory investigation of controversies when they arise, and the President at the opening of the recent session of Congress declared to that body that that expression of belief deserved its favorable consideration. Now Canada has led the way along this line."

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any eleven numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 28, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less. Entry must be made personally, at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated. The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans: (1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years. (2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother. (3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of the homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land. Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa or intention to apply for patent.
