BY A VOTE OF 9 TO 5 COUNCIL DECIDES NOT TO BUY ELEVATOR

Alderman Elkin Will Therefore Not Make His Trip to New York—Report of Water and Sewerage Board Adopted Section by Section—M. G. Teed Retained in McArthur & McVey Suit

At a special meeting of the Common Council held yesterday afternoon the decision by a vote of nine to five decided not to proceed with the purchase of a floating grain elevator for use in supplying grain to the new wharf at West St. John. There were present at the meeting, Mayor Bullock, presiding, Aldermen Baxter, McLeod, Kelley, Lewis, Rowan, Hamm, Willet, McGowan, Holder, Baskin, Scully, Sprout, Elkin and the Common Clerk. A letter from Hon. Wm. Puseley urging the city to secure an elevator and guaranteeing that the cost would ultimately be reimbursed was submitted to the Council. After a lengthy discussion, in which all sides of the question were presented, the Council decided to ask the Minister of Public Works to offer the same terms to the transportation companies interested and request them to supply the elevator. After this matter had been disposed of an appropriation for the construction of blocks for the ferry steamers at West St. John was recommended to the Treasury Board; Chief Clerk's request for counsel to defend him in the Dolson suit was referred to the Safety Board and the C. P. R.'s request for the settlement of the claim against the Cedar street wharf was also referred to the Treasury Board; the report of the Water and Sewerage Board was adopted section by section. The report recommended the settlement of the claim of John Nelson against the city by the payment of \$200; also that M. G. Teed be retained as the city's counsel in the McArthur and McVey suit and that he be paid \$100 as a retainer fee. The Director of Water and Sewerage was instructed to lay out on Water street to supply water to the D. A. R. offices. It was also recommended to seek the Treasury Board to furnish \$500 for the purpose of completing the sewerage extension on Wright and Spruce streets and to complete the Cedar street wharf. It was also directed the chairman to settle all claims arising out of the Loch Lomond extension of the basin laid down by Judge McLeod.

REPORT OF THE HARBOUR COMMITTEE. The report of the Harbour Facilities Committee was then taken up. The report recommended that Ald. Elkin be sent to New York to continue his search for floating elevators and be paid for the new South Rodney wharf. It also recommended that the committee be authorized to receive a communication from the Minister of Public Works. This was done by the payment of \$100 to the committee for the purpose of providing the city with a floating elevator. It is up to the C. P. R. to put the grain on board. COULD NOT PROCEED TOO FAST. Ald. Elkin said the city had adopted the policy of providing facilities in order to build up the winter port business. The western grain business is growing with enormous rapidity and he did not think the city could proceed too fast to keep pace with the development of the western trade. Experts have said that the business will grow more rapidly than the facilities could be provided. As the city is so to be reimbursed he thought the elevator should be secured in order to handle the business offering with as little trouble or delay as possible. He drew attention to the time wasted in shifting the steamers and the consequent loss to the owners.

Ald. Scully said he had come prepared to vote against the proposition, but after listening to the discussion he thought the city should proceed with their inquiries for an elevator. Ald. Baxter said the matter has been referred to the Safety Board and the one of the transportation companies as well as through the city. If the amendment was carried it did not mean that the city was pronouncing against the proposal to securing an elevator. They were only asking the minister to give the transportation companies the same guarantee that he had given the city and let them furnish the apparatus.

ST. JOHN HAS COME WITHIN SMOKE ZONE

Rain is badly needed almost all over the northern part of the continent. From every region comes the tidings that the woods, dried by the long drought, have caught fire and that forest fires of alarming proportions are raging. A smoky haze covers a large section of the country. Navigation on the great lakes has been seriously hindered by the smoke from fires in New Ontario and on the St. Lawrence the same has occurred. Some idea of the magnitude of the forest fires in the region of the great lakes may be had from the fact that on Wednesday Philadelphia was enveloped in a smoky haze the source of which was the fires in Wisconsin, Michigan and Ontario.
