HUGH LAMDEN HAS RESIGNED

OTTAWA, June 28.—The resignation of Hugh Lamden, chief engineer of the National Transcontinental Railway Commission since its organization some five years ago, has been received by the Minister of Railways, Hon. Geo. F. Graham. The resignation has not come unexpectedly. For some months it has been known that Mr. Lamden has been finding the constant duties of his position somewhat too trying and some time ago he notified the commission that he must have leave of absence and an increase of salary. The commission, while anxious to meet all reasonable demands of their engineer, have, it is understood, been desirous that he should make a close personal inspection of the work in actual progress along the line under the district engineers' supervision, and to his administrative work at headquarters in Ottawa.

NEW SCHEDULE OF MARKET FEES SOON

Other than business of a routine nature there was little of any importance transacted at yesterday's regular meeting of the Board of Public Works. Tenders for the supply of coal were opened, the lowest being R. P. & W. F. Starr. A.D. Potts brought down a revision of the market fees and the meeting recommended the bringing into effect of new schedule.

INVESTIGATION SHOWS A PITIFUL CONDITION

Scheme of Overseers of Poor to Save County Expense. ANNAPOLIS, N. S., June 28.—The Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals has been investigating a scheme whereby the overseers of the poor who have jurisdiction over a section in Lunenburg county, intend to save the county expense, regardless of the suffering involved. A partly paralyzed old man and his wife during their life, the overseers transferred this agreement over to a most undesirable couple who were previously known to the overseers of the poor. They also promised to give this latter pair fifty dollars a year for looking after their charges, and also agreed to pay the burial expenses.

PAUL JONES' STORY OF THE FIRST FLAG

Log of the Ranger, First to Fly the Stars and Stripes, Discovered in Boston. BOSTON, Mass., June 27.—The log of Paul Jones' ship of war, the Ranger, which was the first to fly the stars and stripes on the American flag from her peak and flaunt it in the eyes of the Britons, has been discovered among many relics left by the late Erastus Perry Jewell, of Laconia, N. H., noted lawyer, scholar and collector, who died a short time ago. It is now the property of his widow and is securely locked in a safe, but it will probably become the property of the national government within a short time.
