ST. JOHN'S, N. F., Aug. 15.—The continued presence in impending quantities of icebergs and flows along the northern section of the Labrador coast, as reported here today by vessels arriving from that place, may seriously hamper if not prevent progress by the Peary Relief ship Jeanie. There are no fears for her safety, but it is believed that the Jeanie will be considerably delayed in her arrival at Etah, Greenland, the Peary base.

Synopsis of Canadian North-west Land Regulations

any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within five miles of his homestead on a tract of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$200 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cut five fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$200 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$2000.

DR. PUGSLEY BACK FROM THE WEST

Impressed With the Development Which Has Taken Place.

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 15.—Hon. Wm. Pugsley, Minister of Public Works, returned on Sunday in an optimistic frame of mind from a seven weeks' trip throughout the Canadian west.

Dr. Pugsley's important undertakings in the four western provinces, including plans for the improvement of Vancouver Harbor, Vancouver has a magnificent harbor, but the entrance is narrow. The government some ago decided to survey the work and as soon as survey is completed the nature of the improvements to be made will be decided upon by the department.

Dr. Pugsley, who had not been in the west for twelve years, was very fully impressed by the development which has taken place in all sections of the country. The port of St. John, he has given way to an era of wonderful development, and consequently prosperity which affects the whole country in the same way. Places which were mere villages twelve years ago are now thriving towns or cities. But what struck Dr. Pugsley more forcibly than anything else in connection with the development of the country is the use which is now being made of the land which less than a decade ago was looked upon as being little less than useless. At Dundurn, south of Saskatchewan, in what was at one time regarded as a semi-arid district, he met a farmer who has not had a crop failure in seven years, and who this year expects 25,000 bushels of grain off two sections of land. Another farmer in the same district with two thousand acres will have fifty thousand bushels.

SIR FRED. POLLOCK WITH JAMES BRYCE

Distinguished Diplomatist Will Reach St. John Tonight.

NORTHEAST HARBOR, Me., via Bar Harbor, Aug. 15.—In an interview with the ambassador James Bryce on Sunday morning, a Sun reporter and representative was to leave the place at eight o'clock tomorrow morning for St. John, N. B., where he will be the guest of several of the government officials and will deliver an address before the Canadian Club at St. John.

Other than this the ambassador refuses to talk of his trip. Sir Frederick Pollock, the noted author and brother of Bryce, who has been in the west for the past few days, will leave this place on the same boat with Ambassador Bryce tomorrow morning.

AUTO IS CUT SQUARELY IN TWO.

PAWTUCKET, R. I., Aug. 14.—Two were seriously injured and three others had a miraculous escape from death this afternoon when a South Attleboro electric express car cut the automobile in which they were riding squarely in two.

John F. Autram, Jr., of Boston, motored down to Pawtucket this afternoon to visit his mother, Mrs. J. A. Autram, who lives on Broadway. Young Autram had Miss Margaret Cass, also of Boston, as his guest.

The couple spent a part of the afternoon at the home of Mrs. Autram, and then an automobile trip was proposed. Miss Mary Doyle and Miss Mary Bray, neighbors of Mrs. Autram's, were invited to join the party.

The party started out at a good clip, and just when crossing Broadway the electric express came into sight. Autram tried in vain to stop his machine. The motorman on the electric blew the car's whistle and slammed down the brakes. It was too late. The car tore through the machine as if it were paper and passed along the tracks a few yards before it stopped. The occupants of the machine were thrown to the road. Some one on the car sent a telephone message to the Pawtucket police station, and luckily Police Physician Byron U. Richards happened to be in the police ambulance.

When the party had been removed from the street to the Autram home it was found that Mrs. Autram had a bad scalp wound. Internal injuries were also feared. Miss Doyle was injured about the back and internal injuries were looked for. The other three of the party, although cut and bruised, were not seriously injured and regarded their escape as marvelous.

Young Autram went to look for his automobile after the injured were taken to his mother's house. He found the front seat and wheels on the right hand side of the machine and the back wheels, with the body of the machine still intact, in the middle of the road on the left hand side of the track.

The police immediately began an investigation.
