TRI-STATE CLUBS TO START FIGHT MAY 4

LANCASTER, Pa., Jan. 5.—The seventh season of the Tri-state will start on May 4. This was determined tonight at the annual meeting of the Tri-state League held at the Hotel Wheatland. There was no division of sentiment among the delegates as to the wisdom of the latter opening date, for it is felt that the exhibition games preceding will give managers a chance to weed out their material and present only the finished material for the contests that count in President Carpenter's official tables. The season will consist of 14 games, played according to the usual two-game series. The holiday assignment for the fourth of July and Decoration Day will be the same as usual, but at a late hour the delegates were still discussing a proposition to have all eight Labor Day games played in the eastern part of the circuit, as there is a belief that the financial returns are better in this section than in the western.

A Large Number Will Go to Hot Springs for Preliminary Training—Shaw is a Good Hitter.

Manager Dahlen of the Brooklyn Nationals said Saturday that these players would be taken to Hot Springs for preliminary training: Pitchers, Bell, Dessau, Hunter, McIntire, Rucker, Scanlon, Schelsberg, Wilhelm, Dent and Fletcher; catchers, Bergen, Ervin, King, Miller and Ulrich; infielders, Danbert, Hummel, Jordan, Lemox, McEivren, McMillan and Santelli; outfielders, Wheat, Burch, Lumley, Downey, Schinn, Meyers and Blazsky. President Dabets has turned over Holly, Patten, Alperman and Holmes to the Rochester Eastern League club. He has inserted a clause in the club's contract sent to each Brooklyn player prohibiting "bars storming" trips. In Outfielder Shaw, just purchased by the New York Nationals, Manager McGraw says he has picked up a first class hitter, who will strengthen the Giants in this important department of the game. Shaw played ninety-six games with the St. Louis Cardinals last year, cracking out 97 hits in 387 times at bat. He is said to be a trifle weak on fly balls, but McGraw is confident that he can smooth the rough edges. Shaw is a well built, active fellow, who, according to the Giants' leader, simply needs experience, and several pretty good baseball judges say he will be an improvement over the men who played left field at the Polo Grounds last year.

MARSH ROAD THROGGED WITH FLYERS YESTERDAY

THISTLES AFFILIATED WITH ROYAL CALEDONIANS

Gives Local Club Privilege of Seeding Full Rink to Scotland—A Big Organization.

The Thistle Curling Club has received notice that they have been affiliated with the Royal Caledonian Curling Club of Scotland, and the home team will now be entitled to send a full rink to Scotland with any Canadian team that goes over there. There are 77 clubs in Canada affiliated with the Caledonians. There are more than 700 associated clubs and of these 622 are in Scotland, 28 in England, 10 in New Zealand, one in Russia, seven in Switzerland, two in the United States and the rest in Canada. Last year the Canadians played 26 matches and only lost three. The Thistles will meet tonight to elect slips to play St. Andrew's next Saturday.

FIGHT SCENE WILL BE ANNOUNCED JAN. 15

Tex Rickard Gives Salt Lake City Until Saturday to Decide Whether or Not it Wants Bout.

Along about Jan. 15 it will be definitely settled whether that big fight between Tex Rickard and John L. Sullivan will be held. Tex Rickard, the man who put up the money, who, maybe, got it from somebody else, prefers Salt Lake City as the scene of the battle, but Tex does not propose doing any lobbying until he has had a chance to see the Salt Lake folks. "I will return to Salt Lake City on Jan. 15, and when I return I will want to know whether Salt Lake people and the state wants the Jeffries-Johnson bout. It is a business proposition with me. If the fight were to be stopped at the last minute, both fighters would demand the full purse, and under the contract I would have to pay them. I want to hold the fight in Salt Lake, but I must know Salt Lake and Utah, and when I return I will look to them for a yes or no. "I have the fight on a platter. If I am ready to hand it to Salt Lake City and want to do so. I am not going to ask one cent from anybody. The \$10,000 purse called for in the contract I have, in my own money, and where say he started for it here is what he said: "I am standing by Salt Lake, because I promised the business men of the city before I left to hold the fight in Salt Lake. I will give the first chance and I am here to make good my part. It is up to Salt Lake."

HUNDREDS EXPOSED TO SMALLPOX GERMS

Falling Girder Killed Workman—Held Up by Highwayman—Killed His Family, Then Himself.

WAKEFIELD, Mass., Jan. 9.—The discovery that hundreds of persons in this town have been exposed to possible contagion from smallpox has thrown this city into excitement today. A rigid probe has already resulted in the discovery of two cases and the revelation that at least fifty persons have been directly exposed to the dread disease. Most of these people are employed in the factories and mills and have been engaged in their usual labor since their exposure to the germs, thus endangering scores of their fellow-workers.
