## Three Workers Refuse to Join Union and Cause a Lockout of 250,000 English Cotton Hands



JOE RILEY AND HIS WIFE.

Lancashire, Eng., Jan. 26.—Because Joe Riley and his wife refused to stand by their neighbors and fellow workers the great cotton mills of Lancashire, 250,000 men, women and children were forced into idleness and the consequent horrors of mid-winter poverty. For weeks this great army has suffered and sacrificed for the principle of unionism which Riley and his wife denied.

Riley, his wife and another woman, Margaret Bury, who was of the same mind, refused to join the cotton operatives' union. They accepted the benefits of unionism, but they declined to contribute to the union.

The mill owners who have a union of their own were quick to seize upon the incident to crush the union of the workers.

"Ah, you see," said the employers, "our operatives do not want a union. They prefer to deal with us, and we prefer to have them. Now we insist that these three people be allowed by the union to continue to work here, whether they are members of the union or not."

The quarter of a million workers heard this and knew its meaning—open-shop and a disrupted union. "No,"

said they, "The Rileys and Margaret Bury must go or we will go. The mill owners answered by locking out the union men and their wives and children and the great struggle was on.

Riley and his wife started in to work, as if nothing had happened, but soon took flight at the angry threats of their former friends and went to parts unknown. The Bury woman also left.

The lockout is costing the mill owners and the workers almost \$8,000,000 a week.

It is understood that the Rileys and Margaret Bury are being well provided for, temporarily.

One of the largest funerals here for some time was that of A. W. Atkinson. All business in town was suspended for a time. The Masonic lodge, of which deceased was a member, had charge of the services. Ministers taking part were Rev. S. Howard, pastor of the Methodist church; Rev. Dr. Borden, Rev. C. F. Wiggins and Rev. F. W. Desbrières. The pall bearers were Messrs. A. H. McCreedy, C. F. Avel, R. C. Wiggins, F. J. Wilson, H. H. Woodworth, J. S. Hickey. At the grave in the Rural cemetery, the impressive Masonic service was read by Past master Rodds. The floral tributes, which were numerous, included handsome wreaths from the Forester and Masonic lodges.

Raymond Forsey, B.A., who finished his university course here in 1901 passed away on Jan. 17th at Edmonton Alberta, Canada, aged 42 years. He was teaching. His many friends here are sincerely grieved at his early death.
