
WEDDINGS

Salvation Army will Make Special Appeal for Children in their Christmas Campaign This Year.

With the approach of the Christmas season the different organizations which have as their aim the alleviation of the misery of their less fortunate fellows, launched into the work of devising plans by which the homes of the poor may be gladdened with at least a little of the festive spirit of the season.

Among the organizations which dispense Christmas bounty on a large scale is the Salvation Army. The world over, the Salvation Army Christmas dinner, at which thousands are fed, is an event in the lives of many to whom otherwise Christmas would be a day of little significance.

In St. John the Army has for years dispensed Christmas dinners to the needy, and baskets to families found deserving. The same policy will be continued this year by the local organization, and already the different army corps have begun preparations. The officers or soldiers connected with the several stations have been investigating conditions among the poor of their districts and wherever deserving cases are found a well filled basket will be sent out laden with all that goes to make up the Christmas dinner.

Preparations Under Way. To The Standard yesterday Major Taylor said that the Army has already begun preparations for dispensing Christmas cheer. Something for the Children. "Something for the children" will be the slogan with the Army this year. The idea is to provide, through the kindness of those in sympathy with the Army's efforts, some of the things which delight the childish heart on Christmas morning.

To the child there is nothing perhaps that appeals more strongly than the stocking hanging by the fireplace and laden with sweets and other small gifts. To accomplish this the army are in hopes that sympathetic friends will help in the work by sending in stockings filled and ready for distribution among the children of the poor.

Last year about 150 baskets were sent out. Whether more will be needed this year is uncertain as yet, but what ever the need, the Army hopes to fill the void and bring a ray of gladness to the homes where poverty has left its imprint.
