SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST MINING REGULATIONS.

COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years, renewable at an annual rental of at least one acre and more than 2,500 acres can be leased to one applicant. Royalty is 10 cents per ton. An unleased territory the tract must be explored within thirty days after being applied for.

PLACER.—A person eighteen years of age and over, having made a discovery may locate a claim of 100 acres, or less, by 1,000 feet. At least 100 must be expended on the claim each year, or paid to the Mining Recorder. When 1000 has been expended or paid and other requirements complied with, the claim may be purchased at \$1 an acre.

CLAIMS ARE 100 FEET LONG AND FROM 1,000 TO 2,000 FEET WIDE. Entry fee, \$5. Less than \$100 must be expended each year, or paid to the Mining Recorder. Two leases of five miles each of a river may be issued to one applicant for a term of 20 years. Rental, \$10 a mile per year. Royalty, 25 per cent. after the output exceeds 10,000.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price, \$100 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent also to acres, either cultivation, pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead rights may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$100 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 40 acres and erect a house worth \$200.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or rocky land. Live stock may be superadded for cultivation under certain conditions.

WEALTHY WIDOW

MURDERED AND JEWELS STOLEN

Burglars missed strong box containing jewelry worth from \$250,000 to \$500,000—Servant confesses he admitted burglars.

New York, Sept. 9.—Owney Talas, a Russian Finn, for two and one-half months a hall boy in the home of Mrs. Elizabeth Nichols, the aged widow who met death last night at the hands of masked men who robbed her of gems valued at \$10,000, was arrested today after he had confessed, the police assert, to having played a part in the crime.

He was formally charged with murder. All other servants in the house were freed of suspicion, Deputy Police Commissioner Lord announced.

Preliminary examination of Mrs. Nichols' body revealed the probability that she had died of fright, and not of strangulation as at first supposed. Mr. Lord said. An autopsy to be performed later will disclose the exact cause of death.

Although the burglars stripped their victim's drawers and ears of diamonds and other jewels worth \$10,000, they failed to rife the strong-box of her safe in which she kept gems valued at from \$250,000 to \$500,000.

The murdered woman was the widow of James E. Nichols, one of the founders of the wholesale grocery house of Austin, Nichols & Company. She was 60 years old. When her husband died a year ago he left her property valued at nearly \$2,000,000.

Talas, in whose custody she was, his confession, is alleged to have been that for some time several men had been endeavoring to get him to "stand in with them" to rob Mrs. Nichols, but that he had always refused such advances until Tuesday night when he consented to take part in the scheme upon the understanding that Mrs. Nichols was not to be harmed and that only the jewels she wore on her person were to be taken.

He told of being backed into a corner by the men and the plan being to rob the maid in the butler's room. The maid, he is alleged to have said, was threatened and tied up. One man was left to stand guard over her while the others hurried upstairs to the apartment of Mrs. Nichols. Talas is said to have asserted that he was entirely ignorant of what happened in the apartment as he heard nothing. He said, however, that the men were upstairs ten or fifteen minutes, leaving by the basement door and passing by without any comment.
