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HUGH JENNINGS SAYS

There is no Chance to Compare The Red Sox and Giants Managers, Because John McGraw is Peerless - He is in a Class by Himself

The New York Giants and the Boston Red Sox will meet for the supremacy of the baseball world. This is assured.

The great question to baseball men, will either team play up to real form or will they, like every other team in a world's series, save the 1908 Cubs, fall below par?

The 1908 Cubs, who defeated Detroit four out of five games, alone played post-season matches. All others failed to show real class, owing, I believe, to the PECULIAR EFFECT WHICH THE IMPORTANCE OF THESE GAMES EXERCISED UPON THE MINDS OF THE PLAYERS.

Men expected to shine in world's series games; men who have starred all season usually lose their brilliancy during the heat of the struggle for the supremacy of the baseball world.

It will be interesting this fall to note the work of such stars as Joe Wood, the Speaker, Larry Doyle and Jeff Touseau. Will they live up to their reputations or will they, like stars of former league races, fall the victims of this world's series psychology.

Because of this peculiar effect of the importance of these games upon the stars and upon the team as a whole, I will not select a pick-a-winner. A comparison of the strength of the rival teams as they are playing today, however, I can make, and the result may draw his own conclusions.

First, as to managers, the Giants have the greatest manager in the world in John McGraw. He has no peer in the game. It is no disparagement of the Red Sox leader, Joe Stahl, to say that in his opinion McGraw has had a big advantage at the outset.

McGraw has built up teams and won pennants with them. He has made stars of comparatively weak men. He has ripened lemons, like Rube Marquard, into luscious peaches.

Joe Stahl is a fighter, a driver, a leader, all in one. He is one of the scrappiest men in baseball and if he gets anything it is an entitled to depend upon it, he will overlook nothing that brains, resource or strategy can invent.

McGraw gets everything out of his men, because he knows human nature.

Stahl's strength as a leader lies in his ability to go out and play and lend personal leadership and that indomitable spirit of his to the game.

Stahl went to Boston a finished ball player, with valuable managerial experience gained in Washington. But greater than all has been the loyal support of the fans. Boston is the one city where the people know baseball well enough to place the blame for a losing team where it belongs—upon poor players, not upon the management.

When a team goes wrong in Boston the fans figure out which players are at fault and blame them. Hence Stahl has had no personal discouragement.

Stahl can't compare McGraw and Stahl as managers and team builders, because McGraw is in a class by himself.

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PHILADELPHIA

PHILADELPHIA DEFEATED AUSTRALIANS

Philadelphia, Sept. 30.—By the narrow margin of two runs the Gentlemen of Philadelphia today won the first of the series of international cricket matches being played in this country by the Australian eleven.

The match was a very exciting one, and the Philadelphia team, a veteran bowler of international reputation, added more laurels to his career.

With the score at 125 runs for nine wickets in their second innings, three more runs needed to win, and W. J. Whitley, no mean batsman, at one of the wickets, King sent down a fast ball that completely beat the Australian and clean bowled him.

Whitley's partner at the wickets at the time was E. Penfield, who made no effort to score runs, merely blocking out the bowling and depending upon Whitley to bring home the necessary runs to win.

H. Webster of the Australians was top scorer for the visitors, he having a splendid inning of 52. Whitley made 23 runs and E. B. Mayne 20.

The match was started last Friday at the Germantown Cricket Club, The Philadelphians scored 185 runs in their first innings and 74 in their second. The Australians put together 122 runs in their first time at bat and 125 in their second.

All three will have better teams on the field than last season, although some of the departments may be a trifle weaker. The local school fifteen have been practising diligently of late and expect to be in good form when the whistle is blown for the opening game.

In speaking of the Fredericton team, the Fredericton Gladeser says: "The local school will have a strong team in the field this year and as they won the championship last year they will try hard to hold the cup for another year. Eight of last year's team are available this year and there is much promising new material."

"The games will be played in College Field this year as Captain Hal Murray of the U. N. B. team has kindly placed the field at the disposal of the High School management."

"It is the intention of the local school to have the first game played here Oct. 12."

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
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
