Warden McLellan explained that this claim arose out of an arrangement made with a number of ladies who solicited a large amount of money for the nurses' home when it was built that accommodation was to be provided for six denominational nurses. When the Victorian Order of Nurses was organized they took the place of the district nurses and succeeded to their privileges. Commissioner Fisher said that he had been unable to find any record of such an agreement and he questioned very much whether the municipality had any legal or moral liability in the matter and suggested that perhaps it might be disposed of by the city council either making a grant outright or increasing the present yearly grant and asked the warden where he got his authority for stating that the hospital was to provide a home for six nurses.
