## Increased Harbor Revenues.

The harbor revenues for the past month show an increase. The receipts total \$15,827.57 for February, 1917, as compared with \$11,470.11 for February, 1916. This is the more remarkable because of the fact that the sailings this month numbered thirty-six while there were forty-six in the corresponding month of last year. The reason for the increased revenue from a smaller number of steamers is found in the great increase in the amount of inward freight arriving at the port. The months of January and February show a total advance of more than \$10,000 over the first two months of last year. The prospects for March are equally encouraging and it is expected that the coming month will see another record established.
