# Official Statement Respecting Administration of War Tax Acts

Ottawa, Ont., Feb. 13.—An official statement from the Department of Finance gives the following information respecting the administration of the Business Profits War Tax Act, and of the Income War Tax Act, of 1917. The returns, from both these measures, will exceed the estimate made to Parliament as to the amounts expected to be realized. Under the Business Profits War Tax Act, assessments have been made aggregating sixty-five million dollars, of which about fifty-nine million has been consected. The balance will probably be received within the next two months.

The returns, to date, from the Income War Tax Act of 1917, which applied only to incomes in excess of \$3,000, in the case of married persons, and \$2,000 in the case of unmarried persons, show that about thirty thousand assessments have been made, of which nineteen thousand are paid. The total amount of assessments made by the Depart ment, and approved to date, aggregate five and a half million dollars.
