Chicago, Nov. 24.—Bound for Leavenworth, Kan., to fill a ten-round boxing engagement in a federal penitentiary, Gus Rhoades, Jack Johnson's nephew, left Chicago today with George Owens, of New Orleans, a negro fighter of 235 pounds. The bout, which will be held Thursday afternoon before the prisoners, is for the purpose of finding out the former champion's present condition, and is to give him a thorough tryout.

Stabs Star PitcherJames "Hippo" Vaughn of
Chicago Nationals Goes to
Hospital With Razor Cuts.

Kenosha, Wis., Nov. 24.—James "Hippo" Vaughn, a star pitcher with the Chicago Nationals, is in a hospital here today as a result of being stabbed by his father-in-law during a quarrel last night.

The stabbing was the result of a family quarrel, prompted by the divorce proceedings of the Vaughns. Mrs. Vaughn's case for separation was scheduled for hearing yesterday, but they had effected a reconciliation and were preparing to move to Chicago.

As Vaughn was returning to his home he was met outside the street by his father-in-law, Harry De Bolt, and an argument followed. De Bolt, according to the police, slashed at the big pitcher with a razor, cutting through his overcoat and inflicting a slight wound in the abdomen. The wound is not serious. After the stabbing De Bolt fled and has not been captured.
