## NOMINATION PA MEN CONT AND CO

No Speech-making Here

Friday, June 14.  
Nomination papers were filed at the court house for four candidates for the city of St. John for both the Liberal and opposition parties. The other constituency in the province nomination papers were also filed and this is now officially determined.  
Sheriff S. S. deForest opened his office at 10 o'clock yesterday morning to the nominations. The first to be filed were those of the opposition candidates: city, W. E. Foster, J. W. Keirstead, G. Knowlton and W. J. Mahoney. S. Smith appeared as their agent, J. Lewis, as agent for the opposition candidates in the county, was the next to file with nominations for W. E. Foster and Amador Anderson, B. R. Arm and J. C. Belyea then filed the papers for the government candidates in the Philip Gramman, C. B. Lockhart, L. Tilley and John E. Wilson.  
G. Earle Logan, agent for the government candidates in the county filed papers for J. B. M. Baxter and Carson. The usual deposits of \$100 for a candidate, in Canadian government accompanied each nomination.  
At 12 o'clock the sheriff declared nomination closed. His court remained open until 2 o'clock for the receipt of petitions, but none were made, and at 1 o'clock J. D. P. Lewis and J. C. Belyea for the opposing candidates, demanded the sheriff, in accordance with proclamation announced the election would take place on June 20.

## ROOSEVELT HAS WON THIRTEEN DELEGATES SO

Taft Has Been Awarded 1  
Charges of Bribery H  
Across the Floor by C  
paign Managers.

Chicago, June 13.—Eight delegates Col. Roosevelt and eighteen for President Taft marked the day's gains of the chief rivals for the Republican presidential nomination for the decision of cases by the Republican national committee. In addition the committee's disputes between rival Roosevelt in two districts of North Carolina settling the colonel's title to vote those sections.  
It was a day of Roosevelt victories achieved with the full assent of the Taft majority on the national committee. Missouri's contests, threatened another battle between Taft and Roosevelt factions in which lines would be closely drawn, were promised so effectively that the contest were unanimous in giving Roosevelt and Taft six of the contested delegates from that state.  
At the end of a week of constant over the contested delegations, the committee has given President Taft a total of 159 delegates and Col. Roosevelt of 12.  
New charges of attempted bribery the battle for delegates were made Roosevelt, campaign manager for Taft. He charged that a member of the Republican national committee had offered a United States marshal he would vote for Taft on the condition of receiving a bribe.  
"I am prepared to name the necessary," said Senator Dixon, "in word to the committee that as a bribe for Taft votes would be held the senate."  
Senator Dixon dared the Taft majority to be specific and give the name of the Roosevelt leader who is reported to have offered a bribe to a delegate in Alabama and the name of the man who received the money.  
It was reported that the Taft majority have under consideration the introduction of a resolution in the convention to all delegates to vote according to instructions given by their state unless asked by the candidate. Taft after a canvass of the situation expected to control the election committee by a vote of 32 to 21.
