LONDON, May 17.
Consols 98 1/2 to 99; Bank of England
discounts 1 per cent; the rate is now 6
per cent.

The resignation of Goulard, Minister
of the Interior, and of Jules Simon, Min-
ister of Public Instruction, have been ac-
cepted by President Thiers. The reported
ministry of public worship to be re-
established. The new members of the
Cabinet will be either moderately Republi-
cans or members of a party of Left Centre.
Several journals of Paris have been
fined for republishing the letter of Felix
Frat, addressed to Thiers, and printed in
the London Times of the 1st April. The
People's Standard has been suppressed for
publishing editorial articles attacking the
National Assembly.

NEW YORK, May 17.
Gold 118 1/2; exchange 108 1/2 to 110.
John Shadon, President of the Toronto
and Niagara Railway, was killed at Com-
mington station last night, having been
crushed between the platform and cars.
The first Lake Superior steamer arrived
at Goodrich, Canada, last night. The
north shore of the Lake is clear, but
there is still some heavy ice on the south
shore.

LONDON, May 18.
KRIVA CAPTURED.
A telegram from Tiflis of the 17th con-
firms the news that Kriva was taken and
says the Khan was made a prisoner by
the Russians, who have sustained only a
slight loss.

THE FRENCH MINISTRY.
Thiers has appointed Casimir Perier
Minister of the Interior; Tournon, Minis-
ter of Public Works; Bismarck, Minister
of Public Works; and Waddington, Min-
ister of Public Instruction. The other
ministers are unchanged. The monarch-
ists are dissatisfied with the appointment
of Perier. At a meeting of the Right
yesterday speeches were made appealing
to the Assembly to act with energy and
rescue France from Radicalism.

THE CARLISTS.
It is stated that Don Carlos entered
Navarre on the 14th inst., and took com-
mand of the army. The total defeat in
Arragon of Spanish troops under Col.
Munoz by Carlists commanded by Gen.
Tristany is reported.

THE POPE'S CONDITION.
Is still feeble, but the indications of im-
provement are satisfactory.

BAKER ON THE MILE.
A letter received from Sir Samuel
Baker, on the White Nile, reports all
well, and that the passage to the end was
effected with great difficulty, but he hopes
the obstructions will be removed during
the summer.

THE WHITE STAR LINE.
The U. S. Government propose to
