Of the three persons sent Home to England, two were men in very bad health (one of them having serious disease of the lungs and disease of the heart); the third was a female who had been for some time ill in the Jeffery Hale Hospital, and was not likely to recover. They were all very grateful indeed to be enabled through the medium of our Society to rejoin their friends in England.

Of those partially assisted to return Home, one case was that of a man having with him his wife and three children who had searched in vain for employment in Ontario and Quebec, in consequence of his only knowing one particular branch of the shoemaking trade. Some charitably disposed gentlemen having subscribed \$20, this Society contributed \$28, and the Dominion Steamship Company kindly gave them all a passage Home for the \$48. We also partially assisted Home two sick and useless men, and later on two ladies in reduced circumstances, cases in which the amount advanced was certainly well spent.

The Sub-Committee have been applied to on several occasions by young men out of employment desiring to be sent Home, but they were determined on no account (unless under very exceptional circumstances), to break through the rule, which is to send no one Home except cases of great age or infirmity. They have refused no less than twelve applications of this sort during the past twelve months.
