Given in marriage by her father, the bride was gowned in white lace over peau de soie with lace ruffles at the neckline and sleeves. She carried a bouquet of red roses.

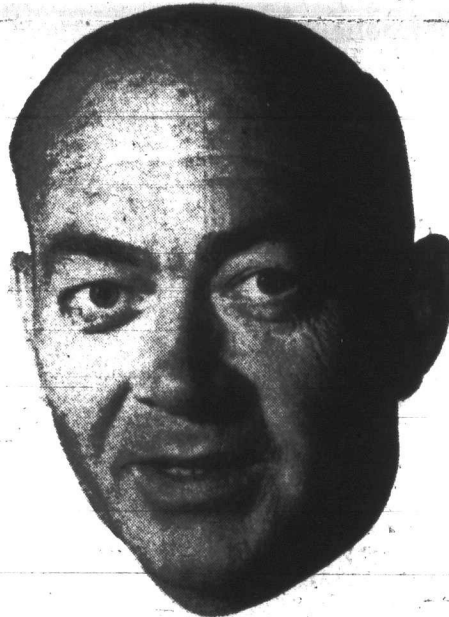
Miss Connie Beck, as maid of honor for her friend, wore a street length dress of aqua peau de soie designed with a low neckline and short sleeves.
