

It should be added that Dr. Crawley feels that when the plan comes into full operation, which will not be before the autumn of 1871, he should be relieved of Rhetoric and Political Economy in the College.

Dr. Cramp is willing to give, without remuneration, time and labour to the departments of Ecclesiastical History and Pastoral Theology. This will give an exercise with each of the Theological classes through each year.

The above scheme is arranged for students who take the regular course. Young men will present themselves from time to time, wishing to take only selected studies. We should endeavour to accommodate all such, and let them take whatever they may be able to take. There will always be studies in the Literary department which such students should attend to; and they can do something in History, Pastoral Theology, and in Theology proper, and in Homiletics, even if they are ignorant of Greek and Hebrew. Let them come, and work with their English Bibles, and we are confident that we can arrange profitable studies for them.
