AWFTL CALAMITY AT SEA.—BURNING OF STEAMER AUSTRIA IMMENSE LOSS OF THE - One of the most heart rending instances human suffering we have ever been called on to record, occurred at sea on the 13th September, in 45 la'itude, 41 30 longitude, when the steam-er Austria, from Hamburg and Southampton to New York, was destroyed by fire, with nearly masses." -- Montreal Witness. al her passengers. There was supposed to have been six hundred souls on oard the Austria when the fire occured, men. women and children, all but sixty-seven of which perished either in the flames or in the sea.
