**LIVE STOCK MARKETS  
TORONTO.**

Receipts of live stock at the Union Yards yesterday were 197 cars, comprising 3838 cattle, 1812 hogs, 2201 sheep and lambs and 286 calves.

The quality of fat cattle generally was common to medium, with a few good to choice loads thrown in with the bunch.

Trade was quite active, with prices 15c to 25c higher for the good to choice butchers' steers and heifers, but the common to medium remained steady to strong at last week's quotations.

There was a good demand for good to choice stockers and feeders, one or two choice lots selling as high as \$6 60 and \$6 75.

Milkers and Springers were in demand at last week's prices.

Sheep, lambs and calves were in active demand at steady prices with last week's close, but hogs took a drop of about 30c per cwt.

Exporters—A few very choice steers of export quality and weights, bought for local killing, sold at \$7 50 to \$8 per cwt., but only five steers at latter price.

Butchers—Choice picked butchers sold at \$7 to \$7 50; good \$6 50 to \$7; medium \$6 to \$6 40; common \$5 to \$5 75; inferior, light butchers' heifers, \$4 50 to \$5; choice cows \$5 75 to \$6 50; good cows \$5 25 to \$5 50; medium cows \$4 50 to \$5; canners and cutters \$3 25 to \$4 25; export bulls \$6 to \$6 75; good butcher bulls \$5 25 to \$5 50; bologna bulls \$4 25 to \$4 75.

Stocks and Feeders—Choice feeders were in demand at from \$6 30 to \$6 60; good feeders \$6 to \$6 25; choice stockers \$5 50 to \$6; medium stockers \$5 to \$5 50; common, rough eastern stockers \$4 50 to \$4 75.

Milkers and Springers—The market for good to choice milkers and forward springers was unchanged, being fully as strong as last week's prices, ranging from \$60 to \$100 each. The bulk of sales were at between \$65 and \$95 each.

Veal Calves—The calf market was firm at unchanged quotations. Choice veals sold at \$9 to \$10; good calves \$8 to \$9; medium \$7 to \$7 50; common calves \$5 50 to \$6 50.

Sheep and Lambs—There was a steady active in sheep and lambs at firm prices. Ewes sold from \$4 25 to \$5 40; culls and rams \$2 50 to \$4; lambs sold from \$7 40 to \$7 65, with bucks culled out at 75c per head less.

Hogs—Hogs were fully 90c per cwt. lower. Selects, fed and watered, sold at \$8.60.

**GREAT LAKE TRAGEDY.**

The greatest and most horrible tragedy ever experienced on the inland lakes, occurred during last Sunday's terrific gale. It is estimated that about sixty persons lost their lives in this terrible disaster of the sea. In the face of a fifty mile gale, there was little hope of rescue for the imperilled ships, and the list of lives lost may reach even a greater number. The following is a list of the steamers which were wrecked.

**STEAMERS WRECKED.**

At least 30 men perished in the capsizing of a 600-foot steel freighter a few miles from the mouth of the St. Clair, in Lake Huron.

A big steel steamer, supposed to be the Joseph Davidson, wrecked off Gross Cap Point, Lake Superior. Efforts to rescue the crew failed.

Large steel freighter, H. B. Howgood, owned in Cleveland, stranded high on Canadian shore of Lake Huron, two miles from mouth of St. Clair. May not be released for months.

Caravel Santa Marie, reproduction of Columbus' ship, swept from harbor at Erie, Pa., to sandbar. Probably lost.

Steamer Acadia, owned in Toronto, is hard aground, but hopes are held that all members of the crew are safe.

Huronic, passenger steamer of Northern Navigation Co. stranded on Whitefish Point, Lake Superior.

Two steamers reported ashore at Isle Royale and Copper Harbor, Lake Superior.

Steamer Simon Langell and two consortes not heard from since leaving U. S. ship canal at Portage Lake, Michigan.
