Completed Prize List Of Brantford Poultry Show

The most successful exhibition of pigeons at the Poultry Show which is being held in the Dufferin Rifle Armouries is none other than Mr. Harry Peirce of this city. He has swept everything before him with his prize winning birds. Entering 26 birds, he is in possession of a like number of honors. Nearly 300 birds were shown, including varieties from the Homer to the Pouter. Mr. Louis Sage, of London, judge of pigeons, has completed his task and the result has been given out. Birds are on exhibition from Ottawa, Goderich, London, Woodstock, Berlin and Hamilton. The pigeon exhibit is proving one of the most interesting exhibits.

The young black Pouter, famous Brooks strain, imported from Scotland this summer, was the special for the best bird in 1913.

terest in this class, also the most special. Mr. Wm. Kingsley of Berlin showed a nice string of birds and was quite successful.
