RUNS THE GAUNTLET

Captain Kendall Again Proves Himself an Heroic Officer.

LONDON Aug. 8- Captain Kendall commander of the Empress of Ireland at the time of the disaster has again proved himself to be equal to an emergency.

The Canadian Pacific steamshi Montrose was laid up at Antwerp when an urgent message came to the London office that she be manned and used to bring away over four hundred refugees. Kendall picked out four engineers who had shore leave took them to Antwerp by the last regular boat, obtained a scratch crew and stokers, then sailed.

He piloted the boat made famous as the scene of Crippen's arrest. through mines in the Channel until-British torpedo-boat destroyer picked her up. The latter then escorted the Montrose to the mouth of the Thames. and the passengers landed at Graves end yesterday afternoon.
