### SOME LESSONS.

King Edward has shown remarkable vitality and successfully passed the time limit of danger-eight days-set by Prof. von Bergmann, the great German specialist, and will, it is now geterally believed, recover. This is gratifying news to the British public and to all English-speaking peoples, as not only the sparing of the life of the King at this crisis but revealing his possession of a constitution capable cf enduring severe strain and encourag'ing the hope that in the ordinary course of events his life will be spared for many years to come. Nor is there any reason to fear that there lives an enemy of His Gracious Majesty who could find it in his heart to cut short a life that is so precious to all people. Commenting upon the King's convalescence, the N. Y. Commercial Advertiser says with much force: "Certainly the manner in which he bore the shock of the operation and the vigor with which his physical constitution has since helped the healing process have heavily discounted the persistent rumors of his undermined health. It is not too much to say that, should the King recover, that fact would discredit an immense and nge-long mass of accusing gossip as no other fact could possibly do. They who live in the fierce light of a throne are inevitably prime objects of pruri- that there was no use in opposing ent curiosity, and the King, when the Government. Prince of Wales, had to bear more than his share of this sort of annoyance. He had his faults, but they were never weighed in the balance of a golden mean. They were magnified beyond all reason. At sixty-one it was said he would surely pay the penalty of his awful and systematic violation of nature's laws. Thus far at least he has shown a power of recovery that a man of thirty might envy."

### THE GLOBE'S APPEAL.

A great change has come over our esteemed friend the Toronto Globe. A few days ago it was quite sure that the Ross Government was safe. It was sure that Ross had a majority of four, and that that would grow. It told the Tories, in effect, to run away and sit down, and quit bothering about the election which was over, and was altogether cocky. But the majority did not grow. It decreased to what the Globe calls "a clear majority of one." It is possibly thus described to distinguish it from another celebrated majority of one, which, it seems, was not clear. From something very like defiance the Globe has come down to smooth persuasion, and talks to the childlike Tories very sweetly and persuasively. It is on its metaphorical knees and makes strong appeal to the Tories to spare the political life of good Mr. Ross. It repeats and re-repeats its eulogy of that great and good man and demands to be shown another in all the province who is qualified to take his place. Listen to the innocent prattle of the now gentle

Globe: "Premier Ross should resign" has become a popular phrase with the opposition press. That is to say, a tried political leader with a clear majority of the House as at present constituted should give way to an untried leader who has not a majority of the House

The Globe defines well: that is what it means. Ross has a "clear" majority of the House; but Whitney has a clearer majority of the people. The fact that Ross is tried and Whitney untried is no reason that Ross should be kept trying and Whitney remain antried. The Globe doctrine would make Ross a permanent premier-a veritable Paul Kruger of Ontario. Moreover, the people are not satisfied with the outcome of the trial of Ross, and they want to try Whitney.
