MARRIAGE IS LEGAL. A

Mrs. Delpit Refuses to Acknow-ledge Annulment by the Church.

Montreal, Dec. 18 .- The judgment rendered by the Roman Catholic church authorities in Quebec last July claring invalid the marriage of Mr Albert Delpit and Miss Marie Jeanne Cote, has been confirmed by a decision of the Propaganda at Rome. Eight years ago Mr. Delpit, who is at present secretary of Lieut.-Governor Jette, and was then secretary of Sir Adolphe Chapleau, married Miss Cote, a minischapleau, married Miss Cote, a minister of the Unitarian church officiating. Three children have been born of the union. In March last Mr. Delpit asked the church authorities of the Diocese of Quebec to annul the marriage, alleging that the contracting parties being both of the Catholic faith, they could not validly be married by a Unitarian minister.

Madame Delpit refuses to recognize the decision of the court of Rome, contending that at the time of her

the decision of the court of Rome, contending that at the time of her marriage she was not a Roman Catholic. Mr. Delpit is now entering action before the civil court for a divorce.

Mrs. Delpit says she will carry her case before the Privy Council if the Canadian courts decide against her.

GOT OFF LIGHTLY.

Cape Town, Dec. 18.—The sentence imposed by the court at Colesberg in imposed by the court at Colesberg in the cases of the men convicted of treason are regarded as very lenient. Van Rensburg was sentenced to eighteen months' Imprisonment and to pay a fine of £500, Roux was condemned to two years and six months' imprisonment, Swart to one year and six months, Fowler to one year, and to pay a fine of £500, Jooste to one year and three months, and to pay a fine of £500, and Muller to one year and three months.

CLEMENTS' NARROW ESCAPE. Johnnesburg, Monday, Dec. 17.—Details of the defeat of the British at Nooitgedacht indicate that Gen. Clem-Nobitgedacht indicate that Gen. Clements' entire force had a narrow escape from capture. The Boer plans were splendidly laid. If the main British column had tarried a little longer there would have been a complete success for the Boers, who exposed themselves undauntedly, yelling and waving their arms. Their rushes were only stemmed by artillery. After the British retreat the Boers held a graver meeting. Their hymns could a prayer meeting. Their hymns could be heard by the retiring British. All accounts indicate a heavy Boer loss. Col. Legge exhibited splendid bravery. He shot five Boers with his revolver before he fell with three bullets in his body.

BOER CAUSE HOPELESS. London, Dec. 18 .- The Times' Cape Town correspondent cables that Judge Melins de Villiers has written a letter to a Victoria West paper, urging those who have the interests of the Dutchspeaking population at heart to put an end to the war. However much loved and valued the independence of the Free State may be, he writes, it is absolutely certain that the struggle on the part of the burghers is hopeless and useless. Judge de Villiers urges that the Dutch Reformed Church should act as peacemakers. The pamphlet by Mr. Botha, late member for Kroonstadt in the Free State Raad, for Kroonstadt in the Free State Kaad, entitled "From a Boer to Boers and Englishmen," has attracted much attention. Mr. Botha strongly denounces ex-President Steyn for betraying the State. He fully recognizes the grevious mistake of English policy in the past and says:—

"If you had sent a strong, capable man like Sir Afred Milner years ago, he would have understood the situation, and the bloodshed might have

Mr. Botha suggests that government by a partly nominated council would give time for wounds to heal before party politics are allowed to stir men's minds. The pamphlet altogether is a striking deliverance from a man of undoubted patriotism in the late re-
