HEROIC MINERS

Many of Them Died in Flame and Smokee Cyclonic Explosion in Coal Mire.

Pittsburg, June 11.-At 10 o'clock this morning a telegram was received at the Pittsburg Coal Co., owners There are only two non-jury cases to of the Port Royal mine in which it was stated that there were from 1 to 16 entombed in the burning mine. Mc Among the number are Wm. Cune, superintendent of the mine, and

W. S. Allison, foreman. Another relief force was sent into the mine at 9 o'clock this morning. Port Royal, Pa., June 11. - Explo-

sion of gas in shaft No. 2 of the Pittsburg Coal & Coke Co.'s mine at about o'clock last night wrecked the shaft fired the mine and caused heavy loss of life among miners of the day shift, the major portion of whom had not yet gotten out of the workings. Twelve men are missing and prob ably lost. Three have been rescued badly injured, and 30 or 40 may be

The scenes about the mouth of the burning shaft, owing to the grief of widowed women and orphaned children are heart-rending in the ex-

Smoke rose from the mouth of the shaft in volumes during the night; Great excitement prevailed and the entire population of the town re-mained all night at the mine, eagerly awaiting some news from those thought to be either buried under tons of slate or slowly awaiting either death from flames or relief from the outside, with small chance favoring the latter.

NO HOPE FOR THE MISSING. After dawn a second party of rescuers came safely out of the mine They say that the black damp makes work impossible, and they give up hope of finding any of the missing alive. Twelve men are known to be missing and are supposed to be dead. Seven years ago there was another disastrous explosion at Port Royal and the mine caught fire. necessary to fill it with water to finally quench the falmes. To do this a hole was drilled from the bed of the

The Port Royal mines are situated on the Youghiogheny river, 37 miles from Pittsburg. They are owned by the Pittsburg Coal Co. The mines are located in the thick vein coal belt, and are, for that reason, extremely gaseous and dangerous. The state mining officials have made their management the object of repeated caution.

WENT BRAVELY TO DEATH. There is little doubt that the first rescuing party, headed by Supt. Mc-Cune, went to death. After their descent two more explosions were heard and at 4 o'clock this morning Mc-Cune's hat and a couple of his letters had been found, the hat torn to tat

McCune was one of the most experienced and popular miners in western Pennsylvania and knew the awful rick he was taking when he went to the rescue of the imprisoned men with his little band of heroes, not all of whose names are yet obtainable.
