Canadian's Success As An Illustrator In Old London.

It is always a pleasure to record the success of Canadians abroad. An instance recently brought to notice is that of an. Norman Mills Price, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Price, of 512 Bathurst street, Toronto, who is distinguishing himself as an illustrator in London. Mr. Price was educated in Brampton Public and High Schools, and in the Toronto Art School, says The Globe. For a time he worked for the Grip Lithographing Company, chiefly in illustrating and drawings from life. Then, with two enterprising companions, he struck out for new fields. Canadians pursued their studies at the art schools of London, and then, with much pluck and some misgiving, opened a modest studio in Fleet street, London, for illustration in its various branches. The young men did so much better than they expected that at the end of a year they were able to take vastly improved questers and bloomed. end of a year they were able to take vastly improved quarters and blossomed out as "The Carlton Studio," at 180 Fleet street. At the present time they have a staff of thirty in their employ, and the firm has established a sound reputation. As their work did not always receive justice in the mechanical ways receive justice in the mechanical treatment for purposes of reproduction, the young Canadians put in an expensive photogravure plant, and have for some time made their own cuts. Mr. Price is the leading artist of the enterprise, and has won considerable distinction by his excellent work in books and magazines. One of the latest and best examples of his work is that contained in a new edition of "Lamb's Tales From Shakespeare," to which he contributes twenty full-page colors. Tales From Shakespeare," to which he contributes twenty full-page color illustrations. Here is The New York Times' comment on Mr. Price's fine work in this handsome volume:—"The illustrator of the Lambs' Tales' is, of course, an interpreter of Shakepeare. Mr. Price's pictures are to be judged only from a high standard. But they suffer nothing by comparison; they are praiseworthy alike as pictures and as illustrations. Some of the large groups are most impressive, and the sense of mere theatricalism is not present in them. The artist has drawn his inspiraton directly from the poet."

British Admiralty Adopt New Metho

A novel experiment has been suc-A novel experiment has been suc-cessfully carried out in connection with the painting of this warship. Instead of employing a little army of dockyard "mateys" to coat the hull with service grey, Admiral Henderson has tested a new mechanical

apparatus.

The principle of this automatic painting machine is very similar to that of the oil-fuel burner. The paint is put in a cylinder, and air compress-ed into it at a great pressure. By opening a little stop-valve the paint is sprayed with considerable force over the surface to be covered. Some little experience of manipula-tion is necessary, otherwise too heavy a deposit results.

The Devonport correspondent of The London Express states that the top-sides of the Encounter, now lying in the Hamoaze, present a beautiful, glossy apper. quite free from that str. so often noticeable in warships sainted by hand.

The saving in time and cost is said to be very substantial. It is only practicable to employ this apparatus against a large surface, such a deposit results

apparatus against a large surface, such as a ship's broadside, where the color is uniform, as the pressure diffuses the paint considerably. Fancy work and the cutting of lines will continue to be done by hand.

#### Tea Consumption.

The British Board of Trade has compiled some rather interesting statistics concerning the consumption of tea and coffee in various lands. The amount of tea used in Great Britain exceeds that of all the other countries of Europe and the United States together. In 1884 the tea consumption in that country was five pounds per head. In 1900 it rose to nearly six pounds.

Russia and the United States come next in the quantity which they consume, but they do not use more than a pound each, while the Frenchman cannot get rid of more than one-twentieth of a pound per annum.

But in the use of coffee there is a different story to tell. Except Russia, England drinks as little coffee as any nation in the world. Seven-tenthe of a pound per year is sufficient for an Englishman, while an American requires ten and a haif pounds. The next largest consumers are the Germans, with six pounds per head, and the French, who consume more than four and a haif pounds.
