On every hand from the Niagara frontier around the head of the lake and down to Oakville little or no damage is re-ported from the frosts of winter. In many sections the greatest anxiety was felt by nurserymen as to the damage likely to be wrought by the exception-ally warm week in the latter part of ally warm week in the latter part of January. Happily these fears are not likely to be realized. A. W. Peart, Burlington, discussing the situation, stated that some slight damage would in all probability result to the more tender varieties through forcing of the buds, but the prospects generally were all that could be desired. The Dawson Commission Co. were of a like opinion. Little or no damage is reported from the barking of the trees from mice.
