AM. STR. PECONIC SUNK

Struck by an Enermous Wave Her Cargo Shifted.

Only Two Out of a Crew of Twenty-Two Men Escape - A Fierce Gale Was Raging and the Vessel Quickly Sank When Struck - A Shocking Marine Disaster Off the Florida

Jacksonville, Fla., Aug. 29.—The American steamship Peconic was lost during a flerce gale early yesterday off during a serie gaie early yesterday on the coast of Florida, and twenty of the crew, out of twenty-two were drowned. The steamer was struck by an enormous wave, which caused the cargo to shift and the vessel quickly

About midnight of Sunday, during the heaviest part of the storm, which had raged all day, the officers of the deck gave the order to put farther out to sea, fearing they were approaching too near to the coast. In the endeavor to turn the ship was struck with a heavy sea, the cargo shifted and she began sinking rapidly. NEITHER FOUGHT FAIR.

Political Men of Rainy River District Charge Corruption.

Toronto, Aug. 29.—Particulars in the Port Arthur and Rainy River election petition were filed yesterday morning with the Registrar of the Court of Appeals by solicitor for Mr. W. C. Preston, the petitioner. At the same time particulars in the cross petition were filled on behalf of the respondent, Mr. H. W. Kennedy, M. P. P., who holds the seat by a majority of 14.

At Port Arthur on September 11 W C. Preston, the defeated Conservative candidate, will attempt to prove that his opponent, H. W. Kennedy, made liberal promises of road grants, tavern licenses and that his agents were active in the distribution of liquor at one point in the riding. The charges also cover about 100 cases where illegal voting is alleged and several cases where foreigners were "rung in" for

The cross-petition is quite as speci-The cross-petition is quite as specific, and if anything more comprehensive. Mr. Preston is charged with having made liberal use of the Preston & Bell Lumber and Furniture Co., of which he is the manager, in securing votes for himself. It is alleged that the company paid money to some men and the expenses of others, to bring them from Winnipeg and other places to vote for Preston, and that this money was subsequently repaid by them.

Another allegation of serious import is that the company advanced to Mr. Preston, its manager, large sums of money to be spent corruptly on the understanding that these sums were to be repaid in the form of timber licenses and other legislative favors.
