PREMIER ORDERS LIBERAL
SPEAKER FROM PLATFORM

Altho Posters Invited Opposition Speakers to Address Audience Sir R. P. Roblin Would Not Allow It

Gladstone Man. July 2.—Sir Rodmond Roblin's meeting at Gladstone yesterday evening provided the most remarkable scene that has ever been witnessed at a political meeting in this constituency. The posters of the local Conservative organization stated that opposition speakers were invited and Joseph Thorson of Winnipeg had been asked by the Liberals of Gladstone to speak in their interests. The local Conservative organization was quite willing that he receive a hearing but the premier absolutely refused to allow it. When this became known the audience arose in indignation and it seemed for a long interval the meeting would be broken up.

When order was finally restored S. Schooley the chairman introduced the Roblin candidate Ashbury Singleton who spoke at considerable length and received a fair hearing.

On Mr. Singleton's resuming his seat J. T. Thorson advanced to the platform and produced a copy of the Conservative posters extending an invitation to opposition speakers demanding a hearing.

"Are you afraid of criticism Sir Roblin?" asked Mr. Thorson.

The Premier would not relinquish his position and ordered Mr. Thorson from

the platform. A second outburst of indignation took place even more prolonged than the first.

During the course of his speech on being interrupted Sir Rodmond described Mr. Thorson as a hiving of the Liberals and a foreigner.

Sir Rodmond spoke for over an hour and delivered his usual address dealing with the progress of the Roblin government and his efficiency as first minister of the province.

Coldwell Amendments

The premier claimed that four men imported from Saskatchewan were corrupting the electors in the Riding Mountains and claimed that Mr. Thorson had been imported to Gladstone to break up the meeting. Sir Rodmond then attempted to explain the Coldwell amendments and claimed that any child could understand them. He said that they merely defined a school but it was obvious that his explanations were not satisfactory to the audience.

The premier declared his opposition to Socialism and wound up his address with an eulogy of his own government. The premier was listened to without enthusiasm and his attitude in refusing to allow opposition speakers to give addresses met with indignant protests from every quarter of the room.

Visiting Nurse

515 Visits Paid by Nurse Campbell During Last Three Months

The regular quarterly meeting of the Board of the Brandon Visiting Nurse Association was held in the Y. M. C. A. on June 29. Nurse Campbell reported that at present the city seemed remarkably free from sickness although 515 visits to patients had been made during the three months since last meeting. Reports were given by several members of the board on the house to house canvass being undertaken. Much interest has been shown in the work and many donations given, but as several hundred dollars are still required to carry on this

year's work the Board hope for a liberal response to the appeal made by mail to those who subscribed so liberally last year.
