

SIMCOE AND ITS VICINITY.

SUDDEN DEATH OF THOMAS DIXON—HIRAM SMITH'S DEATH.

Charles Innes, of the Canning Company, Meets With Peculiar But Not Serious Accident.

Simcoe, Oct. 3.—(Special)—Mr. Thos. Dixon, of Woodhouse Township, about five miles south of Simcoe, received an untimely call to the great beyond Wednesday afternoon about 5 o'clock. Mr. Dixon had driven to Simcoe to order some material for his new house, which was well under way, and also brought some melons with him. These he unloaded at Alken's grocery store, and returned to the vehicle to put the basket in. He then entered the butcher shop of Charles Finch, and on entering looked up in surprise, as if in the wrong place; then, turning around, he dropped dead. Drs. Stanton and Bowley were summoned. Heart failure was said to be the cause of death. Coroner McIntosh was later called, and said an inquest was not necessary. He was a hearty, robust man, and had always enjoyed the best of health. Besides a widow, he leaves three sons and two daughters, all living at home; three brothers, James, of Delhi, Ont.; Whitaker, of Port Dover, and William, who is present adviser and on the present advice, married and living at Spokane Falls, Wash. Mr. Dixon was 53 years of age. The funeral took place on Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock to Woodhouse Methodist Cemetery.

The death occurred on Tuesday morning of Mr. Hiram Smith, aged 70 years. Mr. Smith was well known in Walpole, where he lived from his first marriage. After his second marriage he disposed of his property and came to Norfolk County. He had lived at Waterford and Ferestville before coming to Simcoe. He leaves four small children by his second wife, the first family being all grown up. The funeral took place at Forestville on Wednesday afternoon.

Miss Maudie Anderson returned home on Tuesday, after spending three months at Winnipeg, Man., with her sister. Delhi is receiving more than its share of burglaries. At an early hour yesterday morning three men made an attempt to break into the Bank of Hamilton, but were scared away by being shot at by some of the boys who sleep in the bank.

Her own family consists of two daughters and one son, Mrs. George Shields, of this city, and Miss Viola, at home, and Horace Kitchen. The funeral will take place on Saturday at 3.30 p. m., from 186 Hughson street north.

A SAD STORY.

MURDERER'S MOTHER TELLS OF INSANE TAIN IN FAMILY.

Tearfully Tells of Relatives Who Committed Suicide or Were Inmates of Asylums—Effort to Prove Hodson Insane.

Buffalo, Oct. 4.—With quivering lips and tears streaming down her cheeks, Mrs. Hodson-Haskell tearfully told the jury who will decide her son George's fate of the insane taint which she says has run in the family for several generations.

Her testimony was adduced in an effort to show that George Hodson was not responsible for his actions the night he stabbed Peter Forrestel to death.

After first telling about the boyhood of her son, she went into the family history. Mrs. Haskell said: "George was an inmate of the Buffalo State Hospital. Two sisters who were double cousins of my mother died insane in Bloomingdale Asylum. A girl cousin on my father's side shot herself and her brother also committed suicide. My great grandfather was a great grand-uncle also killed themselves."

The cross-examination of Mrs. Haskell did not develop any new features except that her son had probably kept the cigarette habit during his three years' confinement in the Rochester Reformatory.

The other witnesses for the defence were men with whom Hodson worked on the day he killed Forrestel. They were put on the stand to prove that Hodson had been drinking all the afternoon and evening of July 10th.

Lillian Russell Declares It to be Greatest Blessing of To-day.

Cincinnati, O., Oct. 4.—Lillian Russell to-day delivered a few thoughts on "Love, Divorce and Matrimony." Excerpts follow:

"I do not believe a marriage contract should be permanent. Divorce is one of the greatest blessings of the world to-day. It is one of the greatest for a woman and a man to live together as man and wife after love has passed away. For the woman, I can imagine no more terrible fate than to be divorced to a man she has ceased to love. Divorce is a necessity."

"I do not wish to give the impression that I am a free-thinker and I would not have marriage abolished. But the system as it now is is faulty. "I think the responsibility for unhappy marriages lies mostly with the woman. A woman's financial independence is her greatest blessing. It will keep many a man from saying the fatal 'yes' when it should be 'no.' "I want to warn girls against proposals tainted with the smell of whiskey. Every girl and woman should have some sort of religion."

COUNT QUITS.

Anna Gould is Now Free From Boni.

Paris, Oct. 4.—The time limit in which Count Boni de Castellane had to apply to the Court of Cassation expired to-day and the divorce decree obtained by Anna Gould, the former Countess de Castellane, is now absolute.

Mme. Gould has settled out of court the creditors' claims both against herself and the Count.

The divorce action of the Countess against Boni was one that stirred the United States and Europe, not only because of the sensational revelations brought out in the charges of the wealthy American girl, but because of the political affiliations of the Count as a member of the Chamber of Deputies and the duels in which he had been "successfully" involved. M. Labore, great French barrister, who defended and vindicated Capt. Dreyfus of Devil's Island fame, was counsel for the Countess. The names of many distinguished Parisian lawyers were brought into the trial under initials at correspondents. The Countess charged cruelty and the reckless expenditure of her vast Jay Gould fortune. The case was one of the most conspicuous that has been brought into the public limelight for years. The Count threatened an appeal but he has now, according to French law, lost out completely.

DIVORCE PROBLEM.

Protestant Episcopal Church of U. S. Approves Its Present Position.

Richmond, Va., Oct. 4.—At the convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church yesterday the diocese of Springfield, Ill., sent a petition asking communion to aid in the building fund for the Cathedral of Saints Peter and Paul at Washington and to remember it in their will. A resolution was then adopted commending the construction of the national cathedral.

Several memorials were received in both houses looking to the re-marriage of divorced persons. In both houses a concurrent resolution was adopted, expressing satisfaction that a high moral position had been taken on this subject since the last general convention and the hope that positive action would be taken at the present convention.

The house of deputies received a message from the women's auxiliary, announcing that at the bank-offering services to-day the offerings amounted to \$222,353. At the convention three years ago the offering was \$130,000.

An investigation into charges made by a principal of a college institute against Dr. Embree, Senior Principal of High Schools, was asked for by the latter at the Toronto Board of Education.
