C.N.R. RADIO STA-TION AT MONCTON

On November 7th at 8 p.m. the fornal openingof the Cana.an National Railways new radio broadcast ing station at Moncton, New Brunswick will take place. This station letters CNRA. It has been the practice of the Canadian Ralways the railway plus the in tial letter of the city station is located, but in this instance Montreal having laid cla m to the letter "M" it was decided the letter "A' which stands for Atlantic. Moncton being the head quarters for the Atlantic Region of the Canadian National Railways.

A wave length of 315 metres has been assigned to this station, which it is predicted, w.ll be one of the most powerful on the ed upon the lines of the original Canadian National radio station at Ottawa, duplicating in many details the Ottawa installation and improving others to permit better effi tion. The aerial on the new station is supported by 'two steel 150 feet in height and 200 feet apart. These immense towers are gradually taper to 3 feet square at

degrees east, this being considered the best for transmitting from this given from the western aerial for the reason that it points towards the greatest rece ving zone extending through the New England states and the populous territory along the St. Lawrence and the Atlantic seaboard.
