Adamson is not a rancher but merely a land speculator and never had a herd of cattle or horses on the land. As the settlers, the Minister's office was flooded with applications from people who desired to homestead this land and genuine settlement was wanted to use it. For these Mr. Oliver had no consideration. He allowed the genuine rancher to be held up for many thousands of dollars. It should be explained that Mr. Adamson denied in the House that he received \$22,500, but though repeatedly asked he refused to name the exact sum. Mr. Adamson, brother-in-law, Turf, Hon. Mr. Oliver, Mr. McLean, of Lunenburg, and Mr. Gallagher, who spoke for the defense, all contended that it was nobody's business how much money Mr. Adamson made out of the deal. This is their way of saying that the genuine settler and cattle owner deserves no consideration at all, but is fair game for any member of Parliament who stands between him and the land. Once more the deal was endorsed by a party majority, though it is fair to the better Liberals to say it was reduced to thirty-one by the refusal of more than twenty to vote.

WRONGS OF P. E. ISLAND.

On Monday a motion of Mr. Martin (Quebec, P. E. I.), respecting railway communication between this Province and the mainland, brought out several addresses from the three opposition members. They showed that before Sir Wilfrid became Premier he took a warm interest in the tunnel project. Not only has he failed to advance that scheme, but his administration has come miserably short of providing adequate steamship communication or a regular mail service. Furthermore, though the Government owns the Railways on the Island and the connecting lines on the mainland, with the steamships connecting the two, yet freight rates paid on traffic to and from the Island are oppressively high. They are in fact two or three times larger than the highest rates known in Eastern Canada elsewhere, and double the rates in the West which are a perpetual cause of complaint. Disclosures on this point by Messrs. Martin, Lafargey and McLean, showing that the worst transportation monopoly in Canada is controlled by the Government, produced a strong impression.

FIELDING REBUKED BY HIS COLLEAGUE.

In the course of this discussion the Minister of Finance received a severe and well merited rebuke from the Minister of Marine. The Island members are loyal to the union, but to show the seriousness of the situation they quoted from the local press and local speakers some strong remarks dealing with the Province which are justified in secession, since the terms of union have been broken. Mr. Brodeur was shocked with this language. "I am sorry," he said, "that a newspaper has been publishing articles declaring that Prince Edward Island should secede from the Dominion. These utterances should not be allowed." Mr. Brodeur went on to commend the paper "which is trying to create a sentiment of discontent." The minister indignantly insisted that all the Provinces owe allegiance to Confederation, and declaimed against any person or paper taking "the disloyal course of breaking Confederation." There was more of the same kind. Now when it is rumored that the seat immediately before Mr. Brodeur belongs to Mr. Fielding, the leader of a recent secession movement in Nova Scotia, who as Premier of his Province did his best to smash Confederation it will be understood that Mr. Brodeur's attack made some sensation. For Mr. Fielding did more than talk. His numerous resolutions in the Nova Scotia House. He led a real campaign throughout the country. He caused his party to take what Mr. Brodeur plainly and truthfully calls "a disloyal course." It is said that Mr. Fielding aspires to the Premiership. One would judge that he will not reach that position if Mr. Brodeur can help it.

CANADA IN THE BACKGROUND

This week the correspondence between Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the Colonial Secretary concerning the Imperial Conference to be held in April was brought down. In it the Canadian Government makes a poor appearance, Lord Egin wants to know what resolutions Canada will bring forward. Australia, New Zealand and South Africa have propositions concerning an Imperial Council, preferential trade, international relations, Colonial representation in the Council of Defense, coasting trade, immigration, patent law, Imperial treaty, etc. Canada alone has nothing to bring forward. Sir Wilfrid and his colleagues go to the Conference to criticize or oppose, but without any constructive policy. Their attitude of indifference will hardly commend itself to the self-respecting Canadian people who believe that Canada should have at least as much as any other part of the Empire to offer in this way of suggestion and recommendation. The thoughtful and suggestive addresses delivered in the House on Monday of last week are in sharp contrast to the attitude of the Premier of Canada. Notable among these utterances was the speech of Dr. Thomas Chisholm of East Hants, whose patriotic and illuminating review of the situation and inspiring and practical suggestions of future policy were worthy of the occasion.

ANOTHER MONCTON LAND DEAL

In the Auditor-General's statement recently brought down there is record of a payment of \$10,400 to R. W. Hewson for properties bought at Moncton for the Intercolonial. On Friday Mr. Hewson was a witness in the Public Accounts Committee. He testified that the Government did not buy the land from him at all, but from Matthew Lodge, who will be remembered as the middleman or intermediary in the Moncton deal of last year. Mr. Hewson swore that the recent purchases like those of 1904 were made by him as solicitor for Lodge. He paid \$7,900 for land and damages and Lodge paid him \$260 for his services and \$150 additional outlay making \$8,300. The balance \$2,100 was Lodge's share off. Mr. Hewson testified that he could have bought the land for the Railway Department or anyone else for the same price as he paid when he bought for Lodge.

Premier Trevelyan of New Brunswick has been appointed Lieut. Governor of that Province in place of Governor Snowball deceased.

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS

Twelve school children and their principal were killed in consequence of a fire that broke out in the Protestant school, on Prefontaine Street, Montreal, on the afternoon of Tuesday, Feb. 26th.

At a meeting of St. Dunstan's congregation held in the Cathedral basement Sunday evening, it was decided to hold a banquet in aid of the building fund, during the coming autumn.

Mrs. widow of the late Lieutenant Governor Foster of this Province, died at Kingston on Tuesday of last week. The late Mrs. Foster was, before her marriage, a Miss Doran of Kingston. B. L. P.

The first class car and passenger cars of the through train from Chicago, over the Grand Trunk Railway, were derailed near Guelph, Ont., on the 27th ult., and rolled over a forty foot embankment. Three people were killed and nearly fifty were injured.

A bomb exploded in the cathedral at Madrid on Friday last. Divine service was going on at the time and the explosion caused a panic among the congregation. Several persons were injured in the crush to get out of the building.

At Royal, Quebec Monday—Bert Bonberg, a chief of the nobility and member of the court of the empire, was set upon by six men while out driving and was killed, as was also one of his servants. The other was wounded. The pockets of the dead man were rifled by the assailants who escaped.

The Canadian Royal Mail S.S. Empress of Ireland which sailed from Halifax on Sunday Feb. 24th. at 1.15 a. m. arrived at Bar Light, Liverpool, on Saturday last at 7 a. m. Allowing four hours difference in time she made the run in six days, one hour and forty five minutes, or three hours and fifteen minutes faster than the Empress of Britain on her last trip. This is a record.

J. J. Stewart, editor and principal owner of the Halifax Herald died at his home at Halifax on Wednesday morning of last week. He was a lawyer by profession and was for three a law partner of the late Judge Sedgewick of the Supreme Court of Canada. He was one of the founders of the Herald in 1875 and had been sole editorial manager since 1878.

Three men were killed and several injured as the result of a head on collision on the I. C. R., at Brookfield, N. B., on Tuesday of last week. The night express leaving Halifax for St. John on that evening collided with the incoming C. P. R. express from Montreal. The fireman and baggage-master of the C. P. R. train were instantly killed and the driver of the same train was so badly scalded and injured internally that he died a few hours later.

On Friday last, Mr. Patrick McCloskey of Envyvale, came to his death very suddenly while alone on his way home from Charlottetown. Deceased had been in the city and after finishing his business started to drive home during the afternoon. Death overtook him on the way; for when his horse turned into the yard Mr. McCloskey was found dead in the slight heart failure is assigned as the cause of death. He was about 65 years of age and leaves a large family.

The third of the course of special Lenten sermons was preached in St. Dunstan's Cathedral on Sunday evening last by Rev. Dr. McMillan. His theme was the inspiration of the Bible and his text was from the 16th verse of the 3rd chapter of the Second Epistle of St. Paul to Timothy: "All scripture inspired of God is profitable to teach, to reprove, to correct, to instruct in justice." The Rev. preacher started out by showing the difference between what was that was not inspiration. He showed that Adam was taught by revelation; by God Himself what was necessary to work out his salvation. The flood that was to come upon the earth was revealed to Noah by Almighty God, and Noah was ordered to prepare for it. But neither Adam or Noah was commanded to write down these things; therefore they were not inspired. Inspiration is not revelation. Inspiration is a grace, a gift of God, by which He moves the will and enlightens the intellect of the writer, so that he cannot write what is not true. 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
