HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter sec tion of 160 acres, more or less. Application for homestead entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or a surb-agency. Entry by proxy may however, be made at an agency on
